The structure was insured for \$20,000. The cause of the fire appears to be a mystery, as according to Rev. A. C. Bingham, pastor of the church, the main electric switch leading into the church was thrown off on Friday night. A small fire was left in the furnace, and Mr. Bingham is sure that the blaze cannot be attributed to an overheated furnace. The regular weekly choir practice was held in the church on Friday evening, and according to choir members, everything appeared to be all right at 10 o'clock, when the switch was thrown off and the church locked.
