

DEMPESEY TOPPLES CARPENTIER IN FOURTH ROUND

Challenger Shows Superb Gameness in Face of Terrific Punishment--Staggered Champ in Second

CARPENTIER TAKES COUNT AFTER BEING KNOCKED DOWN TWICE IN 4TH ROUND AND TAKING TERRIFIC PUNISHMENT FROM SECOND ON

Frenchman Meets Dempsey With Own Rushing Style, But His Physique Failed To Stand Up Under Tremendous Attack of Champion, Who Rushed Carp With Fusillade of Blows From Second Round On—Frenchman Staggered Dempsey in Second Round.

JERSEY CITY, July 2.—Jack Dempsey is still heavyweight pugilistic champion of the world. A crushing left swing from the fist of the American fighter shattered the titular aspirations of Georges Carpentier in the fourth round of the "Battle of the Century" here this afternoon.

The blow landed flush on the jaw of the Frenchman, flooring Carpentier for the second time in a trifle more than a minute of fighting in the final and decisive round.

Though he staggered to his feet after the initial knockdown, he was unable to survive the second knockdown, and was motionless when Referee Harry Ertle tolled off the fatal 10.

Though the knockout punch was driven to Carpentier's jaw, the way to Dempsey's victory had been paved by a continual bombardment of blows, which landed on every section of the Frenchman's body. Each swing jabbed an uppercut, scored to the stomach, ribs and sides, contributed to the slow but sure process of the speedy Carpentier.

In addition, a clubbing right which landed flush on the back of Georges' neck in the third round played an important part in his defeat.

The Frenchman folded over in an attempt to protect his body, left the back of his neck exposed, and Dempsey with the fair target in front of him, drove down a terrific slam to Carpentier's vertebrae.

After the knockout, the Frenchman said in his dressing room that this punch was the real cause of his downfall. He said that the punch stung his entire physical and mental make-up and he was thereafter unable to carry on any effective attack.

Regardless of just which blow caused the vanquishing of Carpentier, the Frenchman gave a remarkable exhibition of pugilistic skill and gameness against a heavier and punishing opponent.

Applauded in Defeat.

A favorite when he entered the ring, judging from the cheering he received, he left the arena with even greater applause ringing in his ears.

A tribute to an exhibition which in every way verified and upheld a record which had preceded him regarding his boxing, ability and danger-defying work during the world war.

Dempsey as the winner ran true to his fighting form. Though Carpentier struck the first blow of the encounter, a flying left to the head, Dempsey never at any time backed up or showed a disinclination to avoid trading blows with his opponent. The champion bore in at every opportunity and devoted as much of his attention as was possible to close in-fighting. Rights and lefts were steadily driven home to Carpentier's body, alternated at times by drives, jabs, hooks and cuffs to the Frenchman's face, jaw and head.

FIGHT AGAIN LABOR DAY.

NEW YORK, July 2.—Tex Rickard announced this afternoon that he has the promise of both Dempsey and Carpentier to fight again on Labor Day, presumably in Jersey City. Rickard intimated that Jess Willard would be offered a chance to regain from Dempsey the championship he lost two years ago at Toledo.

PARIS DUMB.

PARIS, July 2.—Consternation fell upon Paris tonight when the defeat of Georges Carpentier at the hands of Jack Dempsey in their bout for the world's championship in Jersey City today was signalled with white lights by aeroplanes, on newspaper screens and by theatre announcements. The crowds, absolutely dumbfounded, refused to believe the first bulletin telling of Carpentier being knocked out.

Heavyweight Champion of the World.

Carpentier Game, Says Dempsey; Lost To Better Man, Says Loser

SAID DEMPESEY:

JERSEY CITY, July 2.—"Carpentier is a good game fellow, but I think I've got it on him," Jack Dempsey remarked as he entered his dressing room after the fight.

The champion was as happy as a school boy. There were no marks on his face or body to show the effect of the Frenchman's punches.

"I won just as I thought I would," Dempsey said. "It was a good fight, and I think the public is satisfied. They say Carpentier staggered me with a right hand punch in the third round. I don't remember being hit even hard enough to shake me up."

"Perhaps he caught me off balance, and it looked as though I was staggering. Perhaps I could have finished him sooner, but I was taking no chances. Carpentier is a technical champion of Europe, and I had my own title at stake and wanted to take no unnecessary chance."

Jack's first thought as he came from the ring was of his mother. He took a pencil and wrote her the following telegram:

"Mrs. C. Dempsey, 3572 South State street, Salt Lake City, Utah: 'Dear Mother, Won in the fourth round. Received your wire. Will be home soon as possible. Love and kisses, Jack.'"

As soon as Dempsey had sent the telegram he sat down in his dressing room and entered into a technical discussion of the combat with Joe Benjamin, one of his sparring partners, and Kearns.

"You've got to hand it to Carpentier, he was surely good," remarked Dempsey on several occasions.

The champion indulged in lively horse play with members of his party.

SAID CARP:

ARENA, JERSEY CITY, July 2.—"I was beaten by a better man—a real champion," said Georges Carpentier shortly after the fight. "I broke my right hand in the second round when I landed a heavy overhand punch on Dempsey's jaw. After that I could only stand him off, he was too strong for me. Dempsey hits the most powerful blows I have ever felt."

In his dressing room Carpentier detailed this statement:

"I staked my all to win in the second round. I hit him hard, but could not drop him. I tried again in the third, but a right to my neck seemed to daze me. I do not know how he got through my guard in the fourth."

"America should be proud of Dempsey. He is a great champion."

Georges returned immediately to Manhattan on the yacht Lone Star. He still rest for three or four days.

"Dempsey is a real champion," said Francois Descamps in the dressing room after the fight. "It was the best light heavyweight in the world against the best heavyweight, another case of Stanley Ketchel against Jack Johnson."

Carpentier made this statement especially for the French press:

"I undoubtedly met the best man in the world. He was too strong for me. He is the most formidable hitter of all time. He is a great fighter. He was in grand condition."
