HAMILTON ROAD CHURCH SHOWS GREAT GROWTH

Celebrates Its Twelfth Anniversary Tomorrow—Inception in Form of Mission.

POPULAR PASTOR

Present Membership of Church

Now Placed at Three

Hundred and Fifty.

Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church is planted firmly in the center of a thriving industrial district of London. With the commencement of industrial development in the south-eastern part of the city, there came a need for a new branch of the Presbyterian Church, and since its inception the Hamilton Road Church has continued to make progress with the district in which it is located. Of late years the progress has been marked, and under the present minister, Rev. M. F. Cree, two hundred names have been added to the membership roll.

Tomorrow the Hamilton Road Church is celebrating its twelfth anniversary. Its inception was in the form of a mission, opened in 1908, in the house now occupied by Alexander Stein, 608 Hamilton road. At that time, it was conducted by Rev. John Smith.

In a little over three years the congregation of the mission had gathered sufficient strength and numbers to contemplate building a church of their own, and with the land once under the title, it was not long before the new building was completed on a site secured at the intersection of Hamilton road and Trafalgar street. This edifice was formally opened in 1912 and commenced a career of quite indispensable service in this part of the city.

Great Progress.

Mr. Cree assumed charge of the Hamilton Road Church on November 5, 1920, and since that time the church has made substantial progress. The membership has steadily increased and all departments of the church have prospered. The mortgage indebtedness has been reduced to the sum of \$4,000, and the maintenance of the church is only \$700. Congregational efforts have united to reduce the church mortgage, but an organization of women known as the Willing Workers has been largely responsible for the reduction of the debt on the manse. They have assumed practically all responsibility for the remaining \$700 and expect in no considerable time to announce the manse as wholly the property of the church and congregation. Two years ago the congregation found themselves in a financial position such that they were able to install a splendid new pipe organ, and with this incentive the church session, lately been making splendid progress.

The success of the church at the present time is due in a large extent to the men who as the building committee and the session, laid its early foundations. First as Mission.

As a mission, the Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church was for three or four years under the charge of Rev. John Smith, Rev. D. L. McCrae, and Rev. M. F. Cree. The church was a Presbyterian church in the city and throughout the presbytery, followed Mr. Smith, and Dr. McCrae in turn was followed by Rev. Mr. Laverie.

Rev. Mr. Cree, who assumed charge after Mr. Laverie, was born near Acton, and attended the High School at Georgetown. His education for the ministry was received at Toronto University and at Knox College, London. He was first stationed at Norwood, in the Peterboro presbytery, and later at Alliston, in the Barrie presbytery.

The present membership of the Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church is about 350.

It is organized to reach every type of individual and draw them into the spiritual and social life of the church. Week-night activities are carried on by C. G. I. T. groups and boys' organizations. In the Canadian standard efficiency training plan, and in addition to these there are the activities of the men and women of the congregation. The choir is a very important institution and contributes in large measure each Sunday to the success of the services. The first organist at the Hamilton Road Church was Miss Bora Stannard, but for the past twelve years the present capable organist and choir leader, Mr. Alexander Stein, has been in charge.

At last night's special council meeting the resignations of Rev. Robert Blair, Councillors Cope and Duncan were accepted by the five remaining officials who still constitute a quorum.

The resignation of Charles Douglas, town treasurer, was not accepted, and a motion was passed that he reconsider it until the next regular meeting, when a full council will be present.

Nomination day for the 3 council vacancies will be held on Good Friday, April 18, and if an election is necessary it will be on Friday, April 25.
