**STRANDED KLONDYKERS.**

Hundreds Are Stalled on the Overland Routes and Are Suffering Greatly.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 30.—J. R. Anderson, who returned from Klondyke, via the Edmonton route, says the suffering there is very great. Mr. Anderson was informed by one prospector, who came from far down the Mackenzie River, that there were hundreds, if not thousands, of miners, mostly Americans, who were half starved and stalled on all the Canadian overland routes. There is also a great scarcity of water. It is difficult to describe the disgust and abject misery of thousands of people, living out of the track of civilization, living on half rations, and unable to move one way or the other. The Peace River crossings are washed out. There must have been a number of deaths. Many are now in bad shape. Of 5,000 who left Edmonton from March to Klondyke, only three people got through to Klondyke.

## THE CHINESE EMPIRE.

**ITS DISINTEGRATION HAS BEGUN.**

A High Chinese Official Declares the Tsung Li Yamen unable to do Anything Unless England Helps with Sword in Hand.

Pekin, Aug. 30.—A high member of the Tsung Li Yamen (Chinese Foreign Office), who is a British sympathizer, complained, in the course of a recent interview, that Great Britain's assurances of support against Russian aggression were belated. "Why," said this functionary, "withhold such a declaration until Russia has secured Port Arthur and France obtained concessions in the south? The disintegration of the Empire has begun, and to-day we necessarily for strong action is too urgent when Russia first obtained a foothold." He admitted that China had broken her promises to England; but this, he argued, was because Russian pressure was too strong to be resisted. He complained of "British ignorance of Russia's line of action," and asked, "Why does not England approach Russia directly with a declaration that Russia's interference in China will be regarded as a casus belli? It is useless to punish helpless China and to participate in the disintegration of the Empire. The Tsung Li Yamen prefers that British influence should be paramount, but it is unable to do anything unless England helps with sword in hand."

\*Charles Adams, a thirteen-year-old son of Mr. Geo. E. Adams, corner of Drummond and Dalhousie streets, Brantford, met with a very serious bicycle accident Sunday. Master Charlie was riding very fast on Dalhousie street, when his wheel struck a snag and threw him violently. His right arm was broken right at the elbow, and so badly fractured that pieces of the bone protruded through the flesh. The boy's arm is so badly injured that it will never be right again and it is feared may have to be amputated.

\*Winnipeg Free Press.—Mr. A. D. Aikenhead, brother-in-law of Hon. R. Watson, left for his home in Aylmer, Ont., yesterday for the Northern Pacific express. Mr. Aikenhead was one of the pioneer farmers of Wellwood, near Carberry, but owing to the ill health of his wife he left there and went to Nelson, B. C., but Mrs. Aikenhead's ill health still continuing, they removed back to their old home at Aylmer, Ont. Mr. Aikenhead came up for a short visit to friends in Portage la Prairie and Carberry at this time and also to look after some interests he still has in the province.

\*On Thursday, Aug. 18th, the Brantford Courier published an item with reference to the death of an unknown man at the hospital there, who gave the names of Mitchell and Hopkins, and whose identity was somewhat clouded in mystery. The remains were buried, and since then nothing has been heard about him. On Monday Mr. James Turnbull, of Glen Morris, and at the office and stated from reading the particulars he concluded that the dead man was Geo. Mitchell, who had worked for him during the spring, and about a week before his death he had been taken ill and asked to be driven to Paris, so that he could take the train to St. Thomas, where he had a sister living. This is the last Mr. Turnbull saw or heard of him till he read the newspaper item.

\*A very sad drowning fatality occurred Monday morning in West Brantford, when Lloyd Austin, a three-year-old son of Mr. W. B. Austin, corner Grant and Richardson streets, lost his life by falling into a cistern. Mrs. Austin was busy with the Monday washing, and a cistern, which opens by a trap in the back kitchen and was full of water, was open near the wash tub. The lady was called to the front door and returned a few minutes after finding her son missing. Shortly after she missed the little boy, Lloyd, but believed he was playing in the yard, where he had been but five minutes before. Not finding him after about an hour she became anxious and started a search, when about eleven o'clock the little body was found floating on top of the water in the cistern. The child was quite dead.

\*A daring attempt was made at about 9.30 o'clock on Sunday morning to burglarize the banking office of S. Barfoot, Chatham. As Thos. Lally, the jeweler, was dressing in his room in the Garner House, he noticed a man removing the screen on a window of what he supposed was Sheldon's liquor store, he started to call out, and the man, who was better known as "Barfoot's" bank. Hastily donning his clothing he notified Mr. Sheldon of the occurrence and the two men started on a search for the robber, whom they found near Harrison hall. The man had in his possession two umbrellas, an overcoat and a padlock. The man appeared at the police court next morning, where he gave his name as Wm. Johnston, and his home as Toronto. He stated to the magistrate that he was under the influence of liquor at the time and had no recollection of the affair. He was remanded to jail until Friday, when he will come up for trial.
