### BIG DAY FOR J.K.L. ROSS

J.K.L. Ross, the Canadian turfman, achieved a proud triumph at the open track at Havre de Grace when his wonderful five-year-old Cudgel, probably the best horse in training at a distance, won the \$10,000 Havre de Grace handicap, with Sir Barton, his gallant three-year-old, finishing third, only a nose behind Willis Sharpe Kilmer's Exterminator. This victory completed a row of successes in the big stakes here, Sir Barton having won one and Constancy another. Added to Cudgel's victory in the big race, Billy Kelly's winning of the Sussex, and his choice's success in the Elite, and the Ross colts had a field day. Billy Kelly broke the track record and stepped the six furlongs in 1.11.15.

### OLYMPIC ROWING TRIALS

It is probable that the Olympic trials to decide who shall represent Canada in the rowing events in Belgium next year, will be held in Ottawa. There was a conference, P.J. Mulqueen, president of the Canadian Amateur Association of Oarsmen, was present, also Captain "Joe" Thompson, of Toronto, Capt. Louis Fournier, Secretary Don Fraser and Harvey Pulford. Preliminary details were discussed. Officers of the C.A.A.O. stated afterwards that Ottawa would in all probability be selected for the Olympic rowing trials.

It is also understood that "Joe" Wright, of Toronto, was suggested as coach of the Canadian crew and Harvey Pulford as honorary coach, the latter to have charge until Joe Wright can secure leave from the University of Pennsylvania.

President Wilson, on the last lap of his tour, is scheduled to speak in Little Rock this afternoon and in Memphis tonight.

## SPORTS THE WORLD OVER

### THOUSANDS ARE TURNED AWAY

Stand in Line All Day, To Be Disappointed—Federal Officers On Watch For Speculators.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Sept. 29.—With every available seat and every available space for standing room in the inclosed seats and the Ring supposed to accommodate 32,000 baseball enthusiasts, assigned or sold, everything appears to be in readiness to-night for the opening game of the world's championship baseball series of 1919 Wednesday.

Never before in the history of the city have such scenes been enacted as were visible to-day in the hotels. The desks of the hotels were packed three deep with visitors trying to obtain sleeping accommodations, and these were being added to as every incoming train arrived. Never before has Cincinnati been called upon to handle such a enormous crowd, and it is safe to say that never before has she been the host to so many men prominent, nationally in their various walks of life.

Correspondents Arrive. One of the first special trains to arrive came from New York and brought 75 of the newspaper correspondents. Among the actor folk on the scene are George M. Cohan, the playwright; Roscoe Arbuckle and Charles Ray of moving picture fame.

Another special train brought 150 Pittsburgh business men. President Herrmann of the Cincinnati team announced early in the afternoon that every available reserved seat had either been sold or assigned for sale, while later in the afternoon the long line that had been maintained all day at the ball park, purchasing pavilion, reserved seats and standing room, was told that the 11,500 seats available there had been taken. This ended the last hope of the thousands of fans who had been waiting for three days for anything from a single ticket to an allotment of four.

Federal officers began a systematic canvass of the sale of tickets to-day and announced that a check would be made on all tickets which leave the regular box offices and that every effort will be made to uncover not only the unlicensed professional but also the temporary scalper, if unlicensed. Players Not Seen.

As for the ball players they were little in evidence. The Chicago White Sox are due to arrive here to-morrow morning. The Reds were given a short morning practice, while in the afternoon the entire team, in a body, visited the Latonia racetrack.

To-morrow the White Sox will have Redland Field to themselves during the forenoon, while the Reds will practice during the afternoon. At Redland Field nothing remains to be done. The new bleachers in left field have been completed, as had the press stand on top of the grandstand. The forty-five wires that will be necessary to flash the news of the series to all parts of the country have been installed in the press boxes and insofar as arrangements go they are all now ready for the word "play ball."

It was announced to-day that Robert Newhall, of the Commercial Tribune, would officiate as the third of the series with J. Taylor Spinks, of St. Louis and William McCready, of Philadelphia, the National Commission appointees.

The executive of the Amateur Athletic Association of the city is busy with the object of putting on a membership campaign in the near future. Last evening a meeting was held at which the work of the organization was discussed. There were present Messrs. Fred Boehmer, Emil Ritz, Richard Long, A. Butler, "Hen" Sturm and John Seaman.

It was decided to endeavor to secure permanent headquarters and gymnasium facilities. A definite announcement on this proposal will be made in the near future. One of the matters it was pointed out which the Association might well bring about is the entry of the three O. H. A. hockey teams as one club. The advantages of such a move have already been pointed out. Definite action to accomplish the object is expected.

Another executive meeting will be held soon. The citizens in the near future will be given an opportunity to make note of the good purpose that the Amateur Athletic Association is accomplishing and there will be occasion for everyone becoming a member.

### CICOTTE MAY BE ON THE MOUND

FOR THE WHITE SOX IN OPENING GAME.

Chicago Team Left Home Last Night

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—Manager "Kid" Gleason and twenty-three members of the Chicago White Sox, American League pennant winners, left here to-day for Cincinnati, where they will meet the Cincinnati Reds Wednesday and Thursday in the first two games of the world series.

Every man on the team was declared to be fit for the championship games and each expressed himself as confident that the Sox would come back to Chicago Friday with two-game lead on Cincinnati. National League rivals Manager Gleason has given his team a complete rest since they clinched the pennant several days ago. Sox Hisses in the final three games of the series each of which resulted in a defeat for the Chicagoans, the line-up was made up mostly of substitutes, and the regulars played such indifferent ball that they were booed and hissed by many "fans" at yesterday's game.

A stiff practice had been planned for today, but the heavy rain of last night put Comiskey Park in such shape that it was thought best to call off the practice park, getting it ready for the first game here Friday. Gleason and his players held a conference this afternoon, however, making their final plans for their invasion of National League territory.

Tomorrow the team expects to take a stiff workout in Cincinnati, either at the Reds' park or, if the Reds file it, at some amateur field. While no definite announcement has been made, the White Sox players are sure that Gleason will pick Eddie Cicotte to hurl the opening game, with Claude Williams as the likely nominee for the second contest. Gleason said Cicotte and Williams would work the first two games, but would not say whether the right hander of the southpaw would be his first choice. Both are said to be in excellent shape, Cicotte having recovered from the soreness which troubled his arm the latter part of the season.

Arrangements have been made for hundreds of "fans" to leave tomorrow for Cincinnati, only a few newspapermen accompanying the team tonight.

### FORMER WORLD'S SERIES WINNERS

STORY OF FORMER SERIES

National League Has Won Five World's Titles Against Ten For Americans.

If there is anything in the law of averages it would seem that the National League has a better chance of winning the series this time. As a matter of fact, it is overdone. For the last four seasons the American League representatives in the world series have carried off the honors. The National League has not on the title since the Boston Braves rode rough-shod over the Athletics and won four straight games in 1914. In the fifteen series that have been played since 1903 the American League has won ten and the National five. The years, winning league and results of the series in games won and lost follow:
