WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—The House pr ceeded to consideration of the Retaliati between the United States and Canada Bill to-day. Mr. McCreary (Dem., Ky.) After referring to the fact that the After referring to the fact that the President's retaliation message had been fulminated since he promised to de-liver an address at the "Harvest Home" he said that Canadians were not al-armed by what was really the outcome of a passing party exigency. He then proceeded with his customary line of argu-ment in favor of Commercial Union and said that if trade was as free between On-tario and Ohio as it was between Ohio and Michigan there could be no chance of friction and no cause for conflict. yielded a few moments to Mr. Bel (Dem., N. Y.), who said : "The measure which is now called up is one of great importance, in which, in com-mon with other members of the House, I take a deep interest. I do so especially be-cause during the last Congress I introduced a similar measure which was adopted by the House. When the President's message was received I was absent. The Committee on Foreign Affairs in the discharge of its duties committee having the matter in charge and the preparation of the report. On my return I thought but proper that the sub-committee having the matter in charge should make the report and I requested my colleague so to do, knowing that the bill would be in excellent hands. I shall take occasion to give expression to my most hearty approval of this measure and to urge its prompt passage." Mr. McCreary said that the message of the President sent to Congress on Aug. 23, 1888, placed the administration in a firm and courageous attitude. It was dignified, reso-lute and courageous and presented a course of action for our Government which was worthy of the approval as all support of the American people. While it might have caused some persons to sulk like Achilles, and others to indulge in abuse, the generals sentiment was that the President should be upheld in his effort to maintain the honor of the country and the rights of, her offizens, This measage and the tariff message of President Cleveland should be recorded to gether, in history: one sough to reduce taxes and lighten the burden of the people, the other to maintain the right and dignity of the American ditizen, and both would be remembered forever. 
