

THE LATEST WAR SCORE.

NOTHING USUALLY SERIOUS IN THE BALKAN SITUATION.

Mr. Balfour's speech—Discussing Home Rule Plans—society at Ascot—London's "Everything to be Done for the Shah—A Transatlantic Critic.

LONDON, July 22.—There has been some loud talk about war this week, as there was last week, but the situation is probably not more serious than usual. Serbian troubles become acute for a moment, then subside into the usual state of chronic inflammation.

Russian intrigues continue, and Austrian country convention between Serbia and Russia has been signed, whether Russia thinks the time for an outbreak in Serbia has arrived, whether Austria has sent a firm despatch to St. Petersburg—all these questions on which evidence is conflicting. The score, it seems there is no hope on the whole dying away. Not is there anything in the dispute between Germany and Switzerland about the right of asylum which is likely to go beyond diplomatic romances.

Mr. Balfour's speech has made an impression on those English Home Rulers who do their thinking for themselves instead of accepting the out-and-dried results to the loose thinking of other people. The Manchester Guardian is one of these. There is no stronger advocate for Home Rule for Ireland, but it might be reasoned and reasonable Home Rule. It declines to follow the newest federal fad. The conditions of successful federation do not exist in these islands, says that journal, and even if they did exist, a federal form of government would be anything but desirable for a country which is in the near neighborhood of the great military States and which has an empire to govern. There are willing and anxious provinces. The Guardian "to do a good deal for Ireland, but not to put the British Constitution into the melting pot. However, Irish opinion is divided. There is one thing that must survive its settlement, and that is the House of Commons."

A Minister in disguise. The Guardian also, nevertheless, that the next Home Rule bill must keep the Irish members at Westminster. Their presence will logically involve the acceptance of one of two theories, Federal Home Rule or Colonial Home Rule. The former is impossible, the latter is impracticable. The Guardian escapes from this dilemma in a truly English way. Logic is nothing. "Try the experiment, since we must, of keeping the Irish, letting them vote not on Imperial affairs only, but on anything they like. Perhaps it might not work so badly after all," says our English Home-Ruler.

Such a plan is the basis to which Mr. Gladstone has all at once reduced the most thoughtful of English Home Rule journals. Each audience in the House of Commons, because it comes from one of those provincial journals to which Mr. Gladstone has so often appealed as a trustee in the House of public opinion. It is, moreover, in justification of Mr. Gladstone's original Home Rule scheme, which has been the Irish members from Westminster. Mr. Gladstone undoubtedly believes his original scheme to be sound. The opposition of his own party drove him to abandon it, but he abandoned it reluctantly and after long hesitation, and he would probably return to it with joy.
