

CROYNSKI BEATS GODFREY.

THE CONY ISLAND BATTLE LASTS 15 ROUNDS.

Corbett Will Not Make a Match With Jackson for a Year and Only Then Mitchell Refuses—Champion Tort Presented With a Medal—Tort and General.

New York, Oct. 31.—Choyanski and Godfrey fought 15 rounds at the Cony Island Athletic Club to-night, when Godfrey was defeated.

The crowd was too large for comfort, and standing room only was to be had by the time the first fight began.

Peter Jackson, in colored pugilist, came in just before the first bout began. His reception was most hearty. It was nearly 9 o'clock when the first battle was announced, the contestants being Kid Hogan of Brooklyn and Dolly Lyons of this city.

The fight lasted 15 rounds, the greater portion of the time being in favor of Hogan. He was generally admitted that Lyons gave the best fight he ever gave in his life.

Godfrey and Choyanski fought 15 rounds before Godfrey was declared the victor. He has only met with one defeat before, and that was in the 15th round of his fight with one from whom Godfrey failed to recover.

Choyanski has been defeated three times by "Jim" Corbett and twice by "Doc" Goddard, but they were all hard-fought battles, and both Corbett and Goddard speak of Choyanski as the highest talent they ever met.

Godfrey, on the other hand, though the oldest man in the prize-ring to-day, is a fighter and a very free hand hitter. He has only met with two defeats before, one to-night in his long pugilist career, one at the hands of Peter Jackson and the other when "Jake" Kilrain knocked him out in the 44th round.

Godfrey and Choyanski were most despatchly fought, and Godfrey made his opponents realize the fact that they had no easy task to perform.

Jackies Must Wait a Year. CLEVELAND, Oct. 31.—Pugilist Corbett to-day said he would not sign papers for a fight with Jackson. He says he will not fight again for a year.
