The First Open to Schools in South Enniskillen

The object of the Fair is to arouse an interest amongst the young people of the rural districts, in agricultural pursuits and demonstrate the possibilities in selecting and breeding of seed and stock. The average producpossibilities in selecting and receiving of seed and stock. The average production of corn per acre in Lambton County is only 80% bushels. Lamentably low, yet nevertheless, true. The County is divided into a number The County is divided into a number of districts and from year to year each group of schools will be made the centre for a SCHOOL FALL FAIR. Directors will be appointed from the senior pupils of each school, who, with one year's experience, will be able to continue the fair with less assistance from the Department but with more gratifying results as their reward for their labor incare and selection becomes apparent. care and selection becomes apparent The hearty co-operation of the trustees, teachers and pupils of Enniskillen is asked that this first Rural School Fall Fair may be a success. The seed for each crop will be selected

from the same sample so the pupils will start on equal basis. After making application to the teacher for materials application to the teacher for materials for any one of classes 1 to 6, it will be supplied by the Department. There are many sources from which one may obtain information regarding the growing and handling of these crops and the one who seeks most will undoutly find most. who seeks most will undoutly nind most.

The main estimates of the expenditure of the Province of Ontario for the year ending October 31, 1914, as announced by Hon. I. B. Lucas, amount to \$9,524,-

The estimates are divided into current expenditure, \$8,353,387; capital account, \$1,042,000; and colonization and mining

The current expenditure has increased \$460,376, and the capital account \$721,-000 over 1913. The principal items in the current expenditure are:

Public institutions maintenance. \$1.

Public institutions maintenance, \$1,-463,612.

Agriculture, \$731,936. Civil Government, \$778,359. Colonization, \$122,600. Colonization, \$122,000. Charges on Crown lands, \$679,500. Repair of buildings, \$172,020. Legislation, \$299,350. Hospitals and charities, \$410,600.

Servant Girl Gets Fortune


