NEWS DIARY.

Canadian.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—The deposits in the post office and government savings banks have reached the highest sum ever known in the Dominion, aggregating a total of \$30,000,000. In Winnipeg the increase was \$11,338.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—The Government will place the sum of \$14,000 in the estimates of the coming season to lay a cable between Nova Scotia and Sable Island.

TORONTO, Oct. 25.—The liquor men here are jubilant over the defeat of the Scott Act in Peel county, and now purpose entering into the contest with renewed vigor.

European.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Latest advices from Madagascar state that it is believed to be too late in the season for the French to march upon Antimannor, the capital.

This will involve a delay of eight months. Sickness among the force is increasing.

In deference to the influence of missionaries the Hova deserters from the Malagasy army are shot instead of being burned alive when captured.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—A despatch from Sydney, N.S.W., states that the British war-ship Nelson had arrived in Orange bay and proclaimed a British protectorate over the south-east coast of New Guinea.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Parliament re-assembled to-day. The following is the Queen's Speech on opening the session:

"My Lords and Gentlemen: I have brought you together to enable you to further consider the great subject of the representation of the people. I continue to maintain relations of amity with all foreign powers.

The information from the Sudan includes painful uncertainties, but the energy, courage and perseverance conspicuously displayed by General Gordon in the successful defence of Khartoum deserve my warm recognition. The advance of my troops to Dongola has had for its object the rescue and security of that gallant officer and those who have so faithfully co-operated with him. I am doing my best endeavors in Egypt to further promote an improvement in the affairs of that country. I have given my support to Egypt in the difficult financial condition in which it was left through the failure of the recent Conference.

I regret the occurrence in the Transvaal and an considering with the Cape Government means to secure the observance of the Convention.

Gentlemen of the Commons: The operations in the Sudan render it necessary to ask of you further pecuniary provision.

My Lords and Gentlemen: A bill for the extension of the Parliamentary franchise will be introduced. May the blessing of God attend your labors."

The War.

All the princes of the empire have been specially summoned to attend an imperial audience at Pekin on Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

The French are pushing away at the Heavens Chines. They do not appear to make much headway. Had England undertaken the invasion the heathen would have been converted long ago.

A recent Paris telegram says that the population of the Department of Seine Inférieure are a drunken lot, hence the cholera spreads amongst them frightfully. That is rough on strong waters, and an argument in favor of prohibition.

Belgium has formed a new ministry.

A Sad Picture.

For months and months a curse has been heaped upon this city by its municipal rulers. Not content with the position, with honor and with power, those men have waxed gross with selfishness and fat with corruption. They have enriched almost beyond cleaning the city's record; they have sold its honor again and again for a bribe; they have maladministered every power entrusted to them. To every remonstrance, to every entreaty that they would turn from their evil ways they have turned a deaf ear. They have taught themselves to laugh at what is right and true; to set up for themselves only the basest standard of self interest. They have no higher morality than the thief's fear of the halter; for they have feared nothing; nothing has kept them from doing their own will but the dread of the people's anger. And this, at last, in their sensual prosperity, they have become fatuous enough to deny. For a long time this evil has been growing, and for a long time the citizens have tolerated it. They have borne with the City Council for the sake of a few good men in it, and because they cling to the hope that there was yet some good in it. They saw there were still some men of good thought in the Council, and the citizens thought that these few would succeed in arousing them and in bringing them back to wisdom. And the few decent men meant well and did what it was in them to do; but it was not to be. The disease was too malignant among the others, it had caught their souls. It had entered their flesh.
