Mr. Deputy Speaker: It is my duty, pursuant to provisional standing order 39A, to inform the house that the question to be raised at the time of adjournment tonight is as follows: The hon. member for Kootenay West (Mr. Herridge), finance—effect of United States tax on inventories of Canadian products.
