part, communities which fall under the Northern Broadcasting Plan. This latter plan, which includes provision for community access, is under consideration by the government. (b) Approximately 50 requests for assistance have so far been received from communities across the country wishing such service.

- 4. Same answer as 3(b) since the same 50 communities remain interested in such a service if the policy is implemented.
- 5. We have received a request from Sioux Lookout, and negotiations are under way for a possible experiment in that community.
- 6. No general implementation of the policy is possible until the Northern Broadcasting Plan is approved.

(b) between September 11, 1973 and October 31, 1974, landed immigrant status was granted to 1,510 persons whose country of last permanent residence was recorded as Chile. This figure includes both special program immigrants and those who came forward under the normal immigrant movement from that country. A further 397 persons from Chile are in Canada on special permits and are at various stages of the landing process.
