THE BUDGET

INTERNATIONAL SPACE STATION PROGRAM— STATUS OF CANADA'S COMMITMENT—GOVERNMENT POSITION— REQUEST FOR CLARIFICATION

(Response to question raised by Hon. John Lynch-Staunton on March 21, 1994)

The Government cannot shed any light on how President Clinton was personally informed of our intention to negotiate an orderly reduction in our involvement in the Space Station or when the President was made aware.

In the lead-up to the 1994 Budget there had been media speculation that Canada might withdraw from the Space Station project. The Minister of Finance made it clear that everything was on the table for consideration in the Government's endeavours to reduce the deficit. Following the United States redesign, which increased Canadian costs, there had been ongoing negotiations with the U.S. on Canada's role in the Space Station and an expectation that these discussions would continue after the Budget.

As acknowledged in the Government's answer to the Senate on March 17, 1994, discussions with the U.S. prior to the Budget addressed the issue of how to best achieve substantial savings in the Space Station Program while retaining a beneficial role for Canada.

U.S. officials met with Canadian officials in Washington on Monday, February 21, the day before the Budget. At this meeting, and in all earlier meetings, Canadian officials carefully observed the Department of Finance's advice on Budget-related negotiations. U.S. officials were not shown the Budget speech relating to the Space Station, dollar figures, or any other Budget-related material not in the public domain. Canadian officials did indicate the Government's intention to contain the costs related to Canada's participation in the Space Station. Those discussions were essential to ensure that Canada secured an appropriate role in the Space Station.
