

Fee: The fee for an 8 weeks' course is 80 Marks plus 10 Marks registration fee for newcomers; for the vacation course (July 7—August 17) 120 Marks (or 70 Marks for each term).

Examinations: At the end of each course an examination (written and oral) may be taken. After passing the examination of the advanced course the candidate receives a certificate testifying that he has a sufficient knowledge of German to pursue his studies at a German university with profit. When the candidate applies for admission at the university this certificate is considered a sufficient proof of his knowledge of German.

Teachers may acquire a **Diploma** by a special examination (Diplomprüfung) held regularly towards the end of March and at the end of the vacation course. In special cases examinations may be taken at other dates.

Rules and regulations may be obtained from the secretary.

Correspondence courses: The Institute has also organized correspondence courses for those who are unable to attend the Institute.

The Institute has established in the Lessing-Haus **special courses** for those students who have not had an adequate pre-university training. Courses are offered in German Literature, History, Geography, Greek, Latin, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Biology during the winter-semester and during the summer-semester. The examination at the end of these courses (Immatrikulations-Prüfung) entitling the students to full immatriculation is held in the Lessing-Haus twice a year in April and October.

The **library** of the Institute in the Hegel-Haus, Am Kupfergraben 4a, consists of about 5000 books covering all branches of German culture and civilisation, dailies, and periodicals. The library is open daily from 9—17 (Saturday from 9—13^{1/2}).

The **Lessing-Haus**, Dorotheenstr. 13, with its charming garden, aims at bringing foreign students into close personal contact with cultured Germans. It has a list of approved German families who are willing to receive paying guests.

The **Hegel-Haus**, the dormitory of the Institute, Am Kupfergraben 4a und 5 (in the immediate neighbourhood of the University) has been established especially for the members of the Institute. If there are any vacant rooms other foreign students may occupy them. The residents have the opportunity to get in personal touch with the German students living there. The house has accommodation for 75 people; it has two large dining-halls, many rooms for social gatherings of the Institute, two lecture halls, the library of the Institute, gymnasium, and collections of pictures pertaining to German landscape, art, history, and especially to present-day Germany.
