Czar's Gift to Czarina Made of Gold Set in Diamonds and Turquoise.

PETERSBURG, May 17.—Czar Nicholas, who will soon remove from the Winter Palace here to the imperial residence at Peterhof, 16 miles west of the Gulf of Finland, has been permitting certain favored persons to see the wonderful jeweled Easter egg which he added this year to the czar's collection. It was made to commemorate the tercentenary of the Romanoff rule, and the court jewelers worked on it nearly a year.

This is a valuable addition to a unique collection which represents in value several hundred thousand dollars. The czar began it by giving his wife on the first Easter (1877) after their coronation, an egg of yellow enamel, the coronation color, decorated with the double-headed imperial eagle in black and surmounted with an exact reproduction of the diamond set which the czarina was crowned in.

ARMIES OF WARRING MAKE THEATRES BATTLE GROUND

John Hansen, American Producer, Asserts Right to Put on Baron de Rothschild's New Play, "Croesus," But Arthur Boucherier, Who Is to Play the Leading Role, Now Holds the Fort.

LONDON, May 18.—(Copyright)—The Garrick Theatre was stormed Saturday by a hundred commissioners hired by Arthur Boucherier, and after a hand-to-hand combat, in which several of the fighters were wounded, the playhouse was wrested from the possession of John SALTER Hansen, an American producer.

Boucherier watched today's fight from the window of a neighboring club. A great crowd witnessed the melee. The commissionaire, who is not known tonight what effect the troubles between Boucherier and Hansen will have on the presentation of the play.

The Boucherier phalanx forced the doors and swarmed all over the building, searching for the Hansen battalions. Several of the invaders are said to have been armed with hammers. It is asserted that Hansen's secretary was struck on the forehead by a hammer, another person, it is alleged, was injured on the forehead by a hammer.

The commissionaires bounced out the veterans as fast as they got the clutches on them. It was a hot scrimmage while it lasted. The police did not interfere. Attackers and defenders were all ex-soldiers.

Hansen drove up in a motor car just after his men were defeated, and made an attempt to break through the crowd. He was arrested Saturday night in Gray inn road on a warrant issued with a view to putting him under bonds to keep the peace toward Boucherier.

FIRST VISIT IN TWO SCORE YEARS

Duke of Cumberland's Trip to England Made For Conciliatory Purposes.

Special Cable to The World. BERLIN, May 18.—The Duke of Cumberland is expected in England in the near future to take the Duchess ostensibly to visit her sister, Queen Alexandra. But it will be a visit of conciliation to the English sovereigns, with whom the duke has been on bad terms for nearly 40 years, on account of Queen Victoria assisting his only sister, Princess Frederick of Hanover, to make a marriage far beneath her position with Baron Pawel Rammingen. It took place at Windsor Castle in the presence of Queen Victoria and the English court in 1830, and the Duke of Cumberland has not been in the country since.

Of late years, on account of his wife's relationship to Queen Alexandra, he has been invited to exchange visits with the English sovereigns if they would make the first one to him and the duchess. But they have insisted upon his going first to Berlin to attend the wedding of Cumberland's son and heir. The Duke of Connaught was to go to represent the King and Queen Alexandra to accompany him. The bridegroom being her nephew, and she no longer the sovereign's consort, her presence was not an acknowledgment of Cumberland's right to have England make the first move toward a reconciliation.

English Sentiment. Then the unexpected death of Alexandra's brother, the King of Greece, made the trip an impossibility for her, while English sentiment urged the advantages to the country of the attendance in Berlin of King George and Queen Mary when so many other sovereigns were expected and state affairs of the highest importance were inevitably involved.

POISON AS CURE FOR SEASICKNESS

But Frankfurt Man's Wife Returned Safely and He's in Jail.

MUNICH, Bavaria, May 18.—(Copyright)—Otto Gierlinger, a business man of Frankfurt, was arrested today charged by the police with having attempted to murder his wife, who arrived here yesterday from New York. It is alleged that Gierlinger took his wife to Marseilles, France, on a pretext that he and she would make a trip to America. He engaged passage for both of them, and after handing his wife two vials of unlabeled secret poison, which he told her were sovereign remedies for sea sickness, he fled ashore. Those are the allegations.

Two Royal Marriages to Take Place One Week Apart.

PRINCE HENRY OF REUSS

Weds Princess Margaret, and Kaiser's Daughter Becomes Prince Ernest's Bride.

Special Cable to The World. BERLIN, May 18.—Princess Victoria Margaret of Prussia was married today to Prince Henry XXIII of Reuss, the wedding taking place just one week ahead of the bride's cousin, Princess Victoria Louise of Prussia.

Princess Victoria Louise's wedding gown is the finest ever seen, but simple with high neck and long sleeves. Its cost is estimated at \$800. The most elaborate part of it is the train, which is four yards long and handmade of the finest lace and embroidered according to a special design by Fraulein von Wedde, one of the most famous embroidery artists in Germany.

Particular attention has been paid to the bridal veil, which was ordered from the Silesian lace school. An attempt was made to buy a picture of the bride, but the picture was destroyed by the fire in the palace.
