The report that redistribution of city wards would be discussed had brought out a good attendance, and while waiting on the deputation from ward one Ratepayers' Association, Ald. Walton was asked to address the meeting.

The alderman said that he had recently examined North Toronto's sewage disposal plant in company with Aid Risk, and altho they had poked their heads into every opening in the structure they could find no objectionable odor of any kind. "In fact," said Mr. Walton, "it is necessary to scrap one disposal plant, I prefer to scrap the one down at Ashbridge's Bay."
