


keep out the cold, Canada's big tailor-ing house is commencing the first ship-ments of agents' sample books for the spring and summer season of 1912. "The spring season begins with us early in January," said one of the managers, when interviewed by a re-porter of this journal. "By the middle of the month," he continued, "our re-presentatives are sending in spring crders." The House of Hobberlin, Limited, control exactly 854 accounts in the Do-minion. That is, there are this many retail dealers handling their lines, and taking orders for Hobberlin made-to-measure clothes. The firm do a strictly made-to-mea-sure business, and in the new plant which has recently been completed, their capacity is about two thousand suits a week. These are all cut to in-dividual measure. The spring sample books now being shipped to the firm's agents contain about 400 different designs and quali-ties of cloths. The size of the sample cloths is exactly twenty inches square, and the total number of yards required reaches in exact numbers 4815. The value of the cloth used is \$5,806. This, of course, does not in-clude the cost of printing and binding, or fashion features of the books, which measure 2 x 3 feet in size. The sample books are most attractively prepared, printers, binders and fashion artists combining to make them a work of both art and utility, and are conced-ed to be the finest of the kind turned out in Canada. It is doubtful if any of the wholesale tailoring concerns in the United States produce anything to caual them.

A very modest estimate of the total cost of these agents' sample books and the cloth contained in them, is placed at ten thousand dollars. This sum is puid out twice in the year, spring and fall, and does not include the large amount paid for "Style Books" and supplementary literature. Immense quantities of style books are sent out for wide distribution each season to the dealers, the total reaching enor-mous figures, for the "Style Books" are the products of the most noted fashion artists, lithographers and printers, and are wonderful creations of the allied arts. The figures are sketched from living models. In the matter of styles it can iruthfully be said that the House of Hobberlin is conceded to be a high authority. From the foregoing the reader will readily understand that it requires a big bank account to conduct a success-ful wholesale tailoring business, requir-ing abundant capital, long experience and immense resources.


FIVE MILLIONS FOR HOTELS



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


