If Dr. Forbes Godfrey's Bill is Passed by the Ontario Legislature - Would Regulate the Construction and Use of All Tenements.

Dr. Forbes Godfrey of West York will introduce a bill into the legislature empowering the government to make regulations concerning apartment or tenement houses. It is his intention to have it considered as part of and to be read with the Public Health Act.

The proposed measure is most comprehensive in its nature and provides that the lieutenant-governor in council shall have power from time to time to make regulations with reference to the erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair and use of tenement houses, as may be deemed necessary, advisable or convenient to ensure the health and safety of the occupants and

of the public generally.

Dr. Godfrey would have the bill apply to cities of 10,000 population and over, and to any other city or town where the council passes a bylaw proding for the bill to apply to that mu-

Not only is the bill to include buildings now used as apartment or tenement houses, but special provision is made regarding any such house to be Infractions are to be punished by a

fine totaling a fixed sum per day after conviction till the cause of offence is removed, with the option of a maximum term in jail of three months.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Sakatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands, Agency or Subsequent of the design of the de must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Dutles.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing, may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
