WOMEN TO DISCUSS STATE QUESTIONS

Delegations From All Over the
Dominion Are Going to
Ottawa.

ADVISE GOVERNMENT

Toronto Representatives Are
Not Yet Officially
Selected.

Just what women will compose the
delegation which will meet the gov
ernment in Ottawa next Thursday,
as announced last week, is still un
known to Toronto women. Mrs.
Campbell-Maciver, secretary of the
Good Government League, when ques
tioned Saturday said she was not
sure how the delegation would be
chosen, but she supposed it would
be a selective delegation, the names
of the women to be given out by the
government at Ottawa. Mrs. Huestis
said she had not heard anything fur
ther than the newspaper announce
ment. She thought the official in
vitations would be issued to the women
chosen very soon. As president of
the Toronto Local Council of Women,
it was suggested that no doubt she
would be a delegate. Mrs. Huestis
thought it possible, but had as yet
received no official notice.

Important Discussion.
The government has sent out word,
or permitted the announcement to be
made, that a delegation of women
from all over the Dominion would be
received and matters relating to the
welfare of the state would be dis
cussed, following in general the re
cent conference between the govern
ment and representatives of organ
ized labor. The women who will
meet the war cabinet will be the
leaders in women's work throughout
Canada.

POLITICS IN WOMEN'S WORLD.

An aftermath of the federal elec
tions of Dec. 17 in Montreal's women
circles is the serious division in the
Montreal Women's Club. This club
will celebrate its 25th anniversary on
April 1, and is one of the largest and
most influential of women's clubs in
Montreal. As one of the affiliated so
cieties of the Montreal Local Council
of Women it took exception to the
action of the local council. Dr.
Ritchie England, speaking on the Lib
eral platform and asked for resig
nation. The refusal of the local coun
cil to accept his suggestion is the
cause of the division.

Bread Pudding.
You were asking for a recipe for
bread pudding recently. Here is one
we use all the time, and it is quite
sufficient to serve four people:
Cut three slices of bread into cubes.
Mix one pint of milk, one or two
slightly beaten eggs, three-quarters
cup of granulated sugar, one-half cup
currants or raisins, a pinch of salt,
and nutmeg to taste. Pour the liquid
over the bread cubes in a baking dish
and dot with butter on the top. Bake
in a moderate oven for half an hour—

One cup suet, one cup sugar, one
cup raisins, one cup currants, one cup
