## Lieut. L. Goad of Toronto Headed Navy to Marmora

Montreal, Feb. 28.—The first unit of the British navy to pass up to ports on the Sea of Marmora, after the declaration of the armistice, was a motor patrol launch which was in command of a Canadian officer, Lieut. Lawrence Goad, of the royal motor boat patrol, who passed thru Montreal en route to his home in Toronto yesterday. As the launch landed its crew, the Greek women of the district who had been living under the oppressive rule of the Turks, strewed the way with flowers, and an old Greek priest came and paid homage to the representatives of the British navy, exclaiming: "After 470 years."

## TURF GOSSIP

To finance the recent purchase and consolidation of the four leading race tracks in the state, the Kentucky Jockey Club has been incorporated and capitalized at \$3,000,000. Of this amount, \$1,000,000 is 7 per cent, cumulative preferred stock, representing the physical value of the properties; and this is to be retired at the rate of \$150,000 annually from a sinking fund provided for the purpose. The preferred stock is being sold at par to Kentucky breeders and horsemen, with a bonus of 25 per cent, in common stock. Johnston N. Cumson, Lawrence Jones and other prominent men are actively interested in the project.

Thirteen of the thirty-eight horses entered for the Ascot Gold Cup race next season are three-year-olds, which seems to indicate that English turfmen regard a thoroughbred of that age as having reached his best estate. Records of the race show that since it was established, in 1807, sixteen three-year-olds have won the cup, as compared with fifty-three four-year-olds, twenty-eight five-year-olds, four six-year-olds, and six aged horses. Among the three-year-olds able to start next season are Milton, Golden Orb, Selwyn and Knight of the Olden, horses who have won the cup, and, with 204, and H. P. Whitney, with 120.

The breeding of race horses in South Africa is becoming an important and extensive industry. Five volumes of the stud book have been published, the last one containing pedigrees of more than one thousand thoroughbred stallions and mares, 579 of which were imported from England, while 17 came from the United States.

Foreign-bred horses have won 761 races in the United States during the last two years. The winners of 452 races came from England; of 145 races, came from France, and, of 35 races, from Ireland.

New York Herald: Commander J. K. L. Ross of Montreal, whose stable earned \$89,178 last season, is the second Canadian turfman who has led the list of winning owners on this side of the border. William Hendrie of Hamilton was the first. Back in 1888 his stable won \$51,361, including the Futurity, then worth \$36,610, which fell to Martimas. He was the only one of Mr. Hendrie's thirteen winners and Martimas cost him only \$750.
