R. stock held by the Manufacturers' Life, amounting in all to 1000 shares, were piedged to the bank for loans.

Paris, April 27.-The widespread labor agitation took a dramatic turn to- her. day when the police executed a series of wholesale searches, designed to unearth an extensive plot against public earth an extensive plot against public Bolivar, Otero, Henry Clay, Bock, La security. The searches included the offices of branches of the labor federation and the homes of labor leaders, prominent royal interests, Bonapartists and Anarchists.

Bacconier, president of the Royalist Advance Guards; M.
