

BOERS INVADING CAPE COLONY. AT TWO POINTS FACING BRITISH

General McDonald Meets Tapped Forces and is Driving Them Slowly to Clemons Show That Boers Outwitted Him.

London, Dec. 18.—The Boers have invaded Cape Colony at two separate points, 100 miles distant, says the Cape Town correspondent of The Daily Mail. "One commando advanced upon Philippolis, seven miles from Kimberley. The other, supposed to be Herold's commando, crossed the Orange River between Orangeburg and Bethulle, northwest of Orangeburg. Its objective apparently being Oudkirk.

General McDonald is engaging the invaders, who have no guns, 20 miles west of Philippolis. The Boers are slowly forcing their way to the Orange River, where a warm reception is being prepared for them.

BOBS THANKSGIVING LATER. Will Not Be Held Until the War is Brought to a Successful Conclusion.

London, Dec. 18.—The contemplated Thanksgiving service in St. Paul's Cathedral in connection with the return of the Boers from South Africa has been abandoned, owing to the Government's announcement "to its being considered desirable to defer general thanksgiving until the close of the war and the return of the Boers to the Orange River to Oudkirk House on Jan. 2 to re-embark, and to land finally at London, coming from that point to London."

WALDERSEE ASSIGNS DISTRICTS FOR MILITARY SUPERVISION

The result was to clear up, so far as that can be accomplished in Washington, some of the points which have been raised in connection with the proposed Anglo-American agreement.
