DESTRUCTIVE EARTHQUAKES. London, Nov. 5 .- Advices received here show that earthquakes were renewed in the southwestern part of Iceland on Oct. 4. One hundred and fifty farms were ruined, a large number of cattle killed, and quantities of stores destroyed. The loss is estimated at 500,000 kroner. No loss of life is reported. There is much misery among the people, who are camping out under improvised shelters.

EVACUATION OF CYPRUS. London, Nov. 6 .- The Daily Telegraph claims to have authority confirming a statement published on Wednesday in the Truth that the Government has decided to abandon the Island of Cyprus, which was given up to Great Britain for administration by the Anglo-Turkish commission in 1878. The Graphic adds that the evacuation of the island is recognized as a necessary corollary to the abandonment of the Anglo-Turkish conven-The decision of the Government was hastened by Russia's view that the convention implied mistrust of the Russian policy, and that the retention of Cyprus nullified the contention that the convention had ceased to exist. Officials at the Colonial Office declare that they are ignorant of any intention on the part of the Government to evacuate the island. The article in Truth asserted that Cyprus would be made independent, but this ts not confirmed.

RUSSIA AND FRANCE.

Their Treaty - Defensive Measure That Does Not Cover Possible French Aggression.

London, Nov. 6 .- The Daily Chronicle says it is able to give, on what it regards as unquestionable authority, the outlines and general effect of the instrument known as the Franco-Russian treaty of alliance. Its date was August, 1890, and at or about that period the French visit to Cronstadt was fixed. The next important date is October, 1893, the time of the Touion visit. That event was followed by the signing of the treaty itself in December, 1893.

The alliance is simply a military convention with special relation to the balance of power created by the Austro-German alliance. It lapses on the day on which that agreement comes to an end. It is purely defensive and contains no stipulation of an aggressive nature. The defensive character of the instrument necessarily implies that it accepts the settlement arrived at by the treaty of Frankfort, and therefore could not be used by France for the recovery of Alsace-Lorraine; in other words, it is directed only against an attack by Germany such as Prince Bismarck meditated in 1875, when France was aved from invasion by the intervention of Queen Victoria and the Em-peror Alexander II.

Fresh codicils have been added, dealng with two situations-first, a curicus scare based on an unfounded re-port of an intention on Britain's part intervene in Morocco; and, second, the recent war between China and Japan. A further but slighter development of the alliance has been the lispatch of, we believe, two French notes to England, concerning the ex-pedition to the Foudan. 
Dun & Co.'s Raview of the Business Situation in Canada.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 6 .- R. G. Dun & Co's weekly statement of trade in Canada says: Montreal business men in all lines profess their gratification at the result of the United States elections, and the feeling of hopefulness for the future which has been gaining ground of late is further intensified. Drygoods men report an improving sorting business, and as far as can be judged, November 4th payments have been very fairly met. Sugars are firmer. Teas and dried fruit generally show continued tendency to advance. The leather market is hardly so active, but values are very steady, and tanners are not disposed to contract ahead. Hides hold their value well, and lambskins are advanced 10 cents. The wool market is stronger, and some holders are not inclined to sell at recent quotations. Butter and cheese are about steady at the figures lately prevailing. Hops have made some gain in value.

The movement of general merchandise of Toronto has been curtailed somewhat by bad weather. The trade is confined chiefly to orders of a sorting-up character. The tendency in orices appears upwards. Remittances show a slight improvement, and with present good prices for wheat and cheese the outlook is encouraging. Failures for the week were 52, as igainst 49 for the same week of last
