DIXON GOT THE DECISION.

New York, Nov. 12.—Through the unlooked-for impulsiveness and stupidity of his brother Jack, Dave Sullivan, the little Irish pugilist, lost the bout to George Dixon, the colored feather-weight champion, last night, at the Lenox Athletic Club. For nine rounds after the call Dixon was Sullivan's master in nearly every instance, but in the tenth round he more than outpointed his adversary. A left-hand hook from Dixon, which caught Sullivan on the head, almost put Dave out of business, but he pulled himself together, only to go to the floor near the end of the round, and Jack Sullivan, one of Dave's attendants, evidently thought that time was up. While Dave was trying to regain his feet, Jack jumped through the ropes and then ran back again. A moment later, just as Dave stood erect, Jack jumped into the ring again, and ran over to the referee, shouting as he ran, "Time is up! time is up!" Jimmy Colville, of Boston, who was referee, looked at the impulsive youngster in amazement, and then spoke to the timekeeper, who said, "Two-forty only," and then Colville waved his hands so as to tell everyone that the bout was over. WINNERS IN WEST HURON

Strong Liberal Candidates for the Provincial and Dominion House.

The Nomination at Duncannon—A Large Convention.

Duncannon, Nov. 12.—The Liberals of West Huron were called upon yesterday to perform the somewhat unusual task of selecting candidates to contest bye-elections for both the Local and Dominion Houses. Despite the cold weather, the snow, and a gale off Lake Huron, fully 250 farmers attended the meeting, some coming from a distance of 21 miles. About one-half of these were delegates to one or the other nominations about to be made.

For the Local House there was but one name mentioned, and the nomination was unanimously tendered Mr. J. T. Garrow, Q.C., the late member. He thanked the delegates in his usual frank manner, and referred to the rumors which have been going the rounds of the Conservative press to the effect that he was about to enter Dominion politics. For the Dominion House there was a superabundance of candidates, but the list was finally reduced to three, namely, Robert Holmes, mayor of Clinton and editor of the Clinton New Era; Mr. M. G. Cameron, Goderich, son of the late Hon. M. G. Cameron, and Mr. J. K. Grant, a sturdy Scotch farmer from Ashfield. All were strong men, and any one would have made a capital candidate. The choice fell upon Mr. Holmes, and the general feeling is that the choice was a wise one. It perhaps particularly fortunate that to Clinton falls the honor of being the home of the candidate chosen for the Commons. Clinton is the recognized pivotal point in West Huron elections. There Mr. Holmes has much influence, having been mayor for the last five years.

Mr. Holmes is president of the Canadian Press Association, and president of the Huron County Sabbath School Association. He is a son of Mr. E. Holmes, formerly assistant provincial librarian, now of St. Catharines, where Mr. Holmes was born 45 years ago. Mr. Holmes' father purchased the New Era in 1885. If the by-word of West Huron, "As Clinton goes so goes the riding," is well founded, Mr. Holmes will undoubtedly be elected.

Mr. McDonald, of Wingham, M. P. for East Huron, and Mr. Alex. Smith, Liberal organizer, were present at the convention.

Resolutions expressing sympathy with the wife of the late M. C. Cameron, and commending the Dominion Government were unanimously passed.

Messrs. Garrow and Holmes, after their nomination, made stirring speeches, predicting victory. Mr. M. G. Cameron and Mr. J. L. Grant submitted gracefully to the will of the convention and promised Mr. Holmes their hearty support. Speeches were also made by the other nominees who had withdrawn, namely, William Proudfoot, a partner of Mr. Garrow; Philip Holt, Goderich; Wm. Coates, Clinton; Dan. McGillivuddy, editor of the Huron Signal; Morgan Dalton, reeve of Ashfield; J. N. McKenzie, deputy reeve of Ashfield, and J. C. Martin.

Nine inches of snow fell at Montreal yesterday.

A military depot is to be established at Montreal very shortly.

Hon. Mr. Mulock has been re-elected vice-chancellor of the Provincial University.

Two thousand dollars' worth of furs were stolen from Trudel & Graham's store, Montreal.

The Queen's Hotel and several business houses at Deioraine, Man., were destroyed by fire.

Dispatches from Hamilton, Guelph and other parts of the province report a fall of snow Thursday night.

Mr. James Lockie, president of the Mercantile Fire Insurance Company of Montreal, died suddenly Friday night.

Gov.-Elect Roosevelt, of New York, will spend the next six weeks at Oyster Bay, resting from campaign fatigue.

At the nominations for the Ontario Legislature for Lennox county on Friday, Mr. Bowen E. Aysworth was chosen by the Liberals and Dr. Meacham by the Conservatives.

The Republicans claim a majority in the United States Congress, Mr. Babcock stating that in the House of Representatives the majority is thirteen over all opposition combined.

Judges Taschereau, Gail and Ouimet, sitting in the case of the contested election of Mr. Etienne Blanchard, M. P. P. for Vercheres, annulled the election with costs against the defendant.

The Canadian steamer Bannockburn went ashore Thursday night about two miles south of Kincardine. The steamer John Long, bound for Goderich with fish, put in there for shelter from the gale.

Mrs. George Smith, a widow, 68 years of age, who lived on St. Catharines street, Montreal, was found hanging from a corner of the rear veranda Friday morning. The deceased had suffered from insomnia lately, and it is thought this unhinged her mind.

During a heavy gale and snow storm the steamer Turret Chief (Capt. Horsefall; pilot Lochane), from Sydney to Montreal, dragged her anchors and went ashore last night about one mile above Berthier wharf, Montreal, and is reported to be in a dangerous position.

Six hundred citizens of Wilmington, N. C., held a mass meeting "to assert the supremacy of the white man." They passed resolutions banishing Alex. Manly, a colored editor, and demanding the resignation of the mayor.

A RAILWAY CONFERENCE

Arrival of Lord and Lady Minto—Farewell to the Aberdeens.

Adjourns to Let the G. T. R. and C. P. R. Get Together.

Grand Trunk earnings for the week ending Nov. 7 were \$533,845 against \$518,569 for the same week last year, an increase of \$15,276.

Canadian Pacific earnings for the same period were \$567,000 this year, against \$627,000 last year, a decrease of \$60,000.

The general passenger agents representing eastern, western and Canadian lines, who have been in conference for two days, continued their meeting Friday in Buffalo. When the afternoon session ended it was stated that an adjournment had been taken to allow the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific roads to get together and settle their local differences, as until that was done nothing in the way of a settlement of the disputes between the Canadian roads and the American lines could be reached.

Quebec, Nov. 12.—Lord and Lady Aberdeen arrived here by the C. P. R. at 2:55 p.m. yesterday. They were met at the station and escorted to their hotel. The escort consisted of a detachment from B Field Battery, while the garrison companies of the R. C. A. furnished a guard of honor of 95 men. A large crowd was in attendance. The presentation of the farewell address of the citizens of Quebec took place at nine o'clock.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Justice Lawrence, in the supreme court, has issued an order directing the sheriff to arrest Andrew Carnegie, the millionaire iron and steel manufacturer. The

application for Mr. Carnegie's arrest was made in behalf of Henry Winthrop Gray, special commissioner of jurors. Mr. Carnegie was served with a notice by Commissioner Gray on Nov. 1, to appear before him on Nov. 10 to testify as to his qualification as a special juror. Mr. Carnegie did not present himself, and Corporation Council Whalen directed a motion to be made for his arrest. The warrant was placed in the hands of Sheriff Dunn and will be executed as soon as possible.

Carbonade, Col., Nov. 12.—Six section men employed on the Rio Grande Railway have been poisoned by drinking water from the Roaring River, and two are in a critical condition. A child, which died in convulsions, is believed also to have been poisoned.

An analysis of the water showed that it contained much arsenic and other poisonous minerals. These come from concentrators in which zinc ore is treated, the tailings being dumped into the river. Hundreds of people in the valley, who used the river water for domestic purposes, are ill.
