### Frances E. Willard

Death of the World Famous Advocate of Temperance,

And Promoter of Various Important Reform Movements.

Brief Sketch of Her Busy Career-Influenza and Gastrie Complications the Cause of Her Demise. New York, Feb. 18.—Miss Frances E.

Willard, the president of the World's and National Women's Christian Temperance Unions, who had been suffering from an attack of influenza, with gastric complications, died shortly after midnight last night at the Hotel Empire, this city. At the bedside of Miss Willard at the

time of her death were her niece, Mrs. W. W. Baldwin; Mrs. L. M. M. Stevens, vice-president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union; Miss Annie M. Gordon, who was Miss Willard's secretary, and Dr. Alfred K. Hill. Miss Willard had been ill for about three weeks. She had the best medical care and treatment that could be given, but, in spite of all efforts, she grew worse gradually until her demise

last night. Dr. Hill made the following statement: "Miss Willard had suffered some years with profound anaemia, and on several occasions had been given up to die. Last summer she seemed to take on a new lease of life, and gained considerably in weight and strength so siderably in weight and strength, so the societies with which she was conwork at Toronto and Buffalo, which was arduous, and came out much better than was expected; and on her arrival here, five weeks ago, she was much prostrated, and readily took on la grippe, which attacked the stomach, liver, intestines, and, later, the nervous system. In 1888 she was made president of the American branch of the International Council of Women and of the World's Christian Temperance Union, which she had founded five years before. Besides many pamphlets and contributions to magazines and the Miss Willard had published "Nineteen Beautiful Years," "A Tribute to Her Sister" (New York, 1863), "Women and Temperance" (Chicago, 1883); "How to Win" (New York, 1886), and "Women in the Pulpit" (Boston, 1888).

AN IRREPARABLE LOSS. Chicago, Feb. 18.-Although the fatal termination of Miss Willard's illness was not entirely unexpected in Evanston, it was, nevertheless, an intense shock to her friends when they heard of it today. Before she developed those qualities of leadership which raised her to a position of so great prominence as an advocate of temperance, Miss Willard was well known to many now living at Evansston, whose friendship was on the same intimate footing when the great leader attained the height of her fame as when her gentle influense and budding genius first made itself felt in the little village. "Rest Cottage," where Miss Willard made her home, was always kept ready for her return. The souvenirs of her work and the many articles of household furniture, made dear by association, were cherished

with great care, and her room was kept in constant readiness for an unexpected return.

THE FUNERAL. New York, Feb. 18.—During the early morning hours today cablegrams, telegrams and messages continued to pour in the Hotel Empire, where Frances Willard lies dead.
