

WEDNESDAY MARKS THE BEGINNING OF FORTY DAYS OF LENT: BISHOP'S PASTORALS READ IN CHURCHES

Present-Day Call for Fasting and Abstinence Not as Severe As in Olden Days—Faithf ul Urged to Pray for Peace.

Wednesday, the 13th, is Ash Wednesday, and the beginning of the 40 days of Lent, which is a period of fasting and prayer, especially in the Roman

Catholic and Anglican churches. Like most if not all the days of penitence, Ash Wednesday, which is always the first day of Lent, has lost much of its ancient severity or strictness. In early days it was selected to expose in public penitence those sinners who were to be received and reconciled, or to partake the communion with the faithful on Easter Sunday; the priests, first of all, heard their confessions. and covered them afterwards with a shirt of haircloth, or a sack, then strewed ashes upon their heads, sprinkled them with holy water, and recited to them accompanied by all the priests, the seven penitential psalms.
