

HEARST'S STEALING OF NEWS REVEALED THROUGH ERRORS

Associated Press Counsel Exposes International Service.

WAILS FROM THE LATTER

Legal Action in States Brings Interesting Revelations To Light.

New York, Jan. 18.—At the close of the arguments yesterday afternoon on the application of the Associated Press for an injunction restraining the International News Service from unlawfully appropriating Associated Press news items, transmitting them to its customers of the International Service, Judge Hand, in the United States District Court, gave both sides until next Monday to file additional affidavits, and until one week from Monday to submit briefs substantiating their verbal arguments.

Toward the end of the hearing, the judge indicated that he had no doubt of the right of the Associated Press to enjoin the defendant news service from stealing Associated Press news items, but he was not clear regarding whether anyone could be restrained from using news articles which had been printed in an edition of a newspaper or on a bulletin board.

Pope Benedict has made representations to the imperial German Government to prevent further deportations of Belgians.

The Turkish Government, says a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam, has sent a note to neutral powers, repudiating statements contained in the Entente reply to President Wilson.

Sergius Sazonoff, former Russian foreign minister, has been appointed ambassador to Britain. It is reported that he will be replaced by Count Nicholas, who accepted it.

Prince Vaclav von Niemcewsky has been appointed viceroy of Poland by the German Emperor, according to a Warsaw dispatch. He is a grandson of the president of the last Polish National Government of 1830.

The Reichstag will not assemble this month, but will meet on February 10, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Central News.

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RUMANIANS ARE AGAIN ISSUING WAR DISPATCHES

Check in Teutonic Offensive May Explain the Greek King's Weakening.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—A Reuter dispatch from Jassy, the temporary Rumanian capital, dated January 13, says that according to latest official communications the Germano-Bulgarian offensive has slackened greatly on the whole front, the attacks being rarer and less furious.

The resumption of the issuing of Rumanian communications, on the progress of the campaign, after a suspension of some time, is regarded here as a sign that the Teutonic forces have progressed beyond the Greek marks.

The Rumanian communication received in Paris by wireless on Wednesday claimed the repulse with great slaughter of the enemy's counter-attacks, and successful activity by the Russo-Rumanian Danube flotilla.

The opinion is expressed in some quarters here that the acceptance by Greece of the Entente ultimatum is a reaction because of the supposed check of the Teutonic allies on the Rumanian front.

Demand Still Good But Prices Down To \$12 and \$11.

Hay dropped to a still lower level on the local market today. The highest price was \$12 a ton, and some loads sold for \$11 a ton. Over a hundred loads were brought in during the last three days, and there was a plentiful supply on the market today. The demand was still good. Straw was unchanged at \$2.03 to \$2.10 a cwt.

The trade was a light scalping one, with the big interests out of the market. The cash demand today was not more than fair. Premiums went up better, then back, and a gain for the day. No oats were changed.

Chicago, Jan. 18.—Prospects of an increasing grain of the rapidly diminishing domestic supply of wheat tended to cause an advance in prices today. The market was firm, and the price of wheat advanced from 1/2 cent to 3/4 cent.

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
