Mrs. Atkins of 343 Thames street, who, with her four children, also went very good time, was equally enthusiastic. "The only thing one could possibly object to for even a moment was the fact that I know Mr. Lance would have done it."

A letter received from Mrs. A. G. Murfin of 251 Wortley road also expressed hearty appreciation of the untiring interest taken by the staff in the comfort and entertainment of the campers. "We all had a right good time," said Mrs. Murfin, "and everything was done that could possibly be thought of to amuse the children and adults. All the first campers will agree with me when I extend the heartiest thanks to the members of the staff who made our pleasure possible."

Mr. Ed. Lance of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, when told of the enthusiasm displayed by the returned campers, spoke warmly of the spirit displayed by all who attended the camp. "It was a most successful day," said Mr. Lance, "it was worth all the effort to have everyone so satisfied. 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How You Can Remove Every Trace of Hair

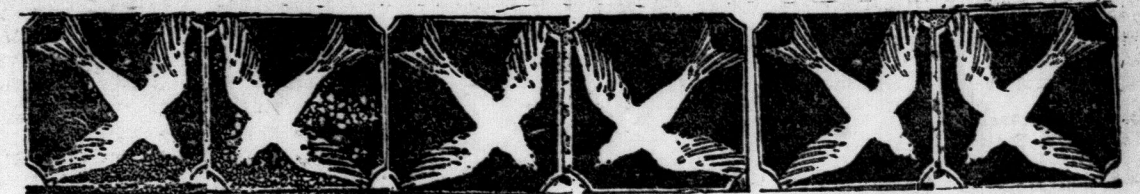
(Toilet Talks.)
