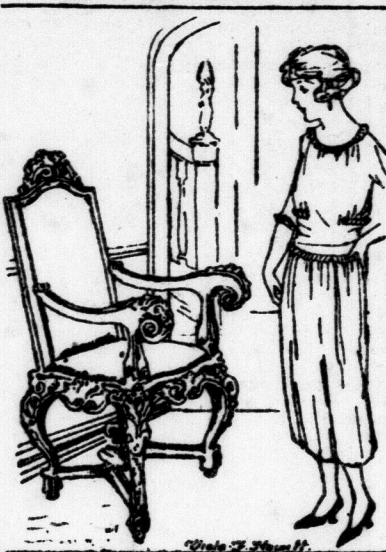

LOUIS XIV FURNITURE.



The grand monarch of France left a lasting impression on the taste of the civilized world. By establishing the great Gobelins works, he gathered together artists under the brilliant LeBrun and set the standard of the world for his own day, and long afterwards, in tapestry, goldsmith's work, furniture, and jewelry, Boule, whose clocks and cabinets are almost priceless today, worked under LeBrun and carried the inlay of metals, tortoise shell, ivory, and beautiful woods, to its highest expression.

Ormolu or gilt bronze mounts, formed one of the chief decorations for furniture of this period. The massive chippendale pieces of the previous reign gave way to the "little chippings," over which were placed great carved, gilded mirrors, or elaborate mantels. The world-famous Gobelins tapestries were made at this time, and the rage for Chinese decoration dates from it.

In general outline the furniture was strong and dignified, but upon this basis a mass of delicate and intricate decoration was used. It was an age of magnificence, but not yet an age of decadence. Under the luxury there is always an air of balance and power, which last, and which the influence of Louis will always claim our appreciation.

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FEEDING THE YEAR-OLD CHILD.

By the time a baby is a year old he can usually take his milk much stronger than any of the formulae for modified milk for infants. Yet cow's milk should be somewhat diluted still. A good rule is to add eleven ounces of strained milk, meal or barley gruel to a quart of whole milk, containing all its cream, well stirred up so that the cream is evenly distributed; add a tablespoonful of granulated sugar, a pinch of salt and a pinch of bicarbonate of soda. In winter, if good milk is bought, it should not be necessary to sterilize or pasteurize it, but if there is any doubt, of course, it is safer.

The baby should now have five regular meals a day, arranged, for example, in the following way: At 6 in the morning, nine ounces of milk, modified as above; at 8, the strained juice of an orange, or a tablespoonful of prune jelly; at 10, seven ounces of milk, and two tablespoonfuls of a well-cooked cereal without sugar; at 2 o'clock, two ounces of beef juice or six of mutton



broth, or a corded egg (these should be varied on alternate days) with five or six ounces of milk and a small piece of zwieback or rusk; at 6, nine ounces of milk, and at 10 nine more. The first and last meals may still be taken from a bottle, but the rest of the milk should be drunk slowly from a cup, and gradually the use of the bottle should be dropped.

Unless there is some special reason against it, a nursing baby should be entirely weaned at a year old.

To make prune jelly, soak the prunes over-night; in the morning add enough water to cover them, stew them slowly until very soft, rub them through a sieve, add a teaspoonful of molasses to each pint of pulp, and stew again for half an hour. This jelly is excellent for a constipated baby.

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AYLMER GIVING LIBERAL LEADER GREAT WELCOME

SWEEPING VICTORY IS PREDICTION OF LIBERAL LEADER

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King Enthusiastic Over His Western Tour.

Windsor, today, accompanied by Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, leader of the Liberal party in Canada, W. C. Kennedy, Liberal M. P. for North Essex, told The Advertiser that both he and the Liberal chiefdom can see nothing but a sweeping victory for Liberal policies at the next Dominion election.

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King and Mr. Kennedy leave on Thursday to speak at a big meeting at Aylmer in the interests of the Liberal candidate, W. G. Charlton.

Unionists Unpopular. Discussing the western situation with The Advertiser, Mr. Kennedy declared that the National Liberal and Conservative party is just as unpopular with the rank and file of the electorate as when they called themselves Unionists.

"There can be but one result in a Dominion election," he said, "and that is an overwhelming Liberal victory." Starting at Victoria on September 27, Mr. Kennedy has been making a tour of the west, visiting 27 meetings covering all the important centres in the provinces of

British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, and in all addressing approximately 100,000 people. The meetings were uniformly successful and enthusiastic, and Mr. King's reception everywhere was most cordial. There was not a single unfriendly interruption from the first meeting to the last.

The outcome of the meetings was a revival of Liberalism and once more there is a united and aggressive Liberal party in Western Canada whose influence will be in evidence when a general election comes, said Mr. Kennedy.

ST. GEORGE'S MOTHERS' CLUB.

"The Sub-normal Child" was the subject of a very interesting address delivered at the St. George's Mothers' Club meeting on Tuesday evening by Dr. Hill of the Institute of Public Health. Dr. Hill instances hereditary feeble-mindedness and injury or disease as the causes of sub-normal children, giving the mental tests for children from 2 to 14 years of age. He also declared that often lack of a definite object towards which to work or incentive for which to work, caused apparent sub-normality in children.

On the request of several mothers, he also dealt briefly with the subject of mal-nutrition. He said that children's weight should be judged by their height rather than their age, and that every school should be supplied with a weighing machine, so that the children may know their correct weight. A lively discussion followed Dr. Hill's talk, many of the mothers having questions ready to ask him. Miss Lulu Somerville and Mrs. Moore furnished the musical part of the program.

The subject of the "Civic Government" will be the subject of study and the city bylaws will be discussed. It is expected City Clerk Baker will address this meeting.

IRMA. Irma is one of the many feminine names derived from Teutonic mythology. Its evolution is somewhat involved and it cannot be definitely determined when or how its final form, which is evidently the Anglicization of a Teutonic form, Curiously enough, it is traced back to its mythological origin. It is revealed that the third of January was said to be the day a deity worshipped as Irma or Ermin. The evolution of this word, though German, is irrelevant here, but the curious fact remains that the feminine form appears in the Teutonic language as Herma, or Irminie or Irma, as one might suppose.

In Italy, however, the name Erminia was the name of a gaily virgin of the sixteenth century. Spain had already received Irmin and had proceeded to give it various interpretations, until a certain Hermenbarga was discovered among the royal princesses. This name was offered in marriage to a Frank king, but the honor was declined.

Ermeninda was the name of the lady who carried the blue blood of the Baiten to the line of Alfonso. Her name meant public dignity. Soberly, in his famous poem, calls her Herminda. The Anglo-Saxon version was Ermenia and Irma, and the Germanic form is Irma. The latter form is frequent in Germany today.
