

Why There May Be Failure. "Looking over the whole field the riends of public ownership may well friends of public ownership may well feel gratified with the progress which has been made during the past year," said Mr. Wright's address. "Almost everywhere public opinion is becoming more positively and pronouncedly favorable. Where the policy has been tried it has been an almost unbroken record of success. There have been failures of course, not serious as a rule, but still instances in which the ventures have come short of anticiventures have come short of antici-pated success. It will not be the part of wisdom for us to ignore these or seek to minimize them. The causes of failure should be studied in order that mistakes may be avoided and needed remedies applied.

In some instances municipal bodies have, without any especial knowledge or fitness on the part of their members, attempted to directly manage the enterprises.
