



Bookmaking in New Zealand. WELLINGTON, New Zealand, July 19.—(C.A.P.)—Three years ago parliament legalized bookmaking with unsatisfactory results. A considerable number of undesirable arrivals from Australia and betting on horse races increased. Now a strong demand is being made to repeal this legislation, as the feeling is almost unanimous that the bookmaker must go. The totalisator in the profits of which the state participates is also threatened. Parliament will shortly vote on the number of race meetings, which has increased unduly.

CHICAGO, July 19.—Jack Johnson, champion heavyweight prize fighter, will have to turn some \$700 of his wealth over to Cook County as a result of boasts and vainglorious controversy with Geo. Little, his former manager.

Johnson, at that time, asserted in disputing Little, that he had \$30,000 in the bank, a valuable automobile, and diamonds worth \$10,000. The statement was printed and a copy retained by the county board of assessors.

Now he will be assessed on this amount of personal property. His profits of the fight July 4 are not subject to the tax under the Illinois law, having been acquired since April 1.
