GOOD SOLID SWATTING OPENER AT BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, Aug. 8 .- Plenty of good, solid swatting characterized the opening tilt between Toronto and Baltimore this afternoon, which was called while the

With the exception of Crowell, who relieved Sherman in the seventh, all the other flingers in the game found the going decidedly rocky, and this included Sherman, Markle, Hérbert, Russell and Thompson. Several of these did not remain on the pitching peak very long, but all found that the day was one for the clubbers, and not for the flingers.

Markle started off for the Leafs, but he lasted less than two rounds, Herbert coming to the so-called rescue. It measured 130 feet in length by 80 feet in width. The stripes were over six feet wide, while the stars in the union measured five feet across from point to point.
