

SENATOR REVILES TORONTO TROOPS

Choquette Casts Vile Aspersions on Men Recruited Here.

TOO MANY ENLISTED

More Men Recruited Than Being Used, Declares Quebec Representative.

OTTAWA, April 12.—When the bill for the £20,000,000 loan for use in carrying on the war came up for third reading in the House of Commons, Senator Choquette said that he presumed part of this money was to be used for the purpose of carrying on recruiting. He wished, he said, to record his strong disapproval of the present time of recruiting and for two reasons: First, there were recruited more men than were being used; there were 150,000 men in Canada at present who should be sent overseas before more were recruited. Secondly, he opposed recruiting for the reason that there was a scarcity of farm laborers, and it was not right that when the country was short of farm help men should be taken from the farms to study. It was the duty of the government to stop recruiting. It was a waste of money, time and men to continue recruiting.

Crimes to Recruit. Senator Choquette said that he knew of soldiers who are being recruited on streets in Quebec who had been enlisted twelve months ago. It was a crime for the government to have young lawyers and officers going into the parishes getting young men to leave the farms and go to the cities, where they were liable to spend years doing nothing before they were needed at the front.

"I repeat," said the senator, "that it is a crime to take these young men from the farms." Many were recruiting in the winter simply for a little money, and were returning to the farms in the spring.

Senator Choquette does not mean that he is against the recruiting of men who are willing to go to the front. He had no objection to the recruiting of men who were being taken from the farms to do better service in the trenches. He was simply against the recruiting of men who were being taken from the farms to do nothing before they were needed at the front.

CAMP AT NIAGARA OPENS IN MONTH

Twelve Battalions Will Go Under Canvas on May Fifteenth.

ROUTE MARCH TODAY

Hundred and Forty-Two Men Applied Yesterday for Overseas.

Niagara camp will open on Monday. The announcement from military headquarters, Toronto, means that one month from now twelve battalions will cross the border to go under canvas at Niagara-on-the-Lake. These twelve battalions will probably include at least some of the battalions now "billeted" in the city, and some of those with barracks in Hamilton.

Major F. C. B. Harrison, principal of Macdonald Agricultural College, has been recommended for the command of the 9th Battalion, which is being organized at Niagara-on-the-Lake. Major Harrison is a graduate of the University of Toronto, and has had long experience with active militia battalions in Ontario and Montreal.

Tomorrow morning the battalions in Toronto will start on a big day and route march. The day day manoeuvres will likely be held in the morning. The route march will be in the afternoon. A good total of 142 recruits volunteered for active service with the colors in Toronto yesterday. Seventy-six of these were accepted for the 9th Battalion. The recruits were distributed as follows:
