Canada Will Pay

For Garrisonian Halifax and Esquimaux and Have Control.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The Canadian government will take over from the Imperial authorities on July 1 next the Halifax and Esquimaux defences.

Canada will foot the entire bill for the garrisons on the Pacific and on the Atlantic coast. All that the Dominion does at present is to pay part of the cost of the defences at Esquimaux.

It is understood that the British government suggested that Canada should pay \$250,000, or a million and a quarter dollars, of the cost of maintaining these defences and leaving the control in the hands of the British government.

Canada would not consent to do this. She adhered to her own terms and to assume the control and foot the whole bill. It was not a question of time in the Dominion.
