NORTH TORONTO DELICACY MISSION.

The contributions and work of this Mission have been chiefly confined to the holidays, with the exception of visits to private families.

Two members of the Evangelistic Committee held several prayer meetings at the homes of the very sick, and also distributed

delicacies.

The Pansy Band (girls) visited Victoria and Grace Hospitals, and at the latter distributed fruit in custard cups, with texts attached, also gave to the patients in public wards large Xmas cards.

The Refuge and Aged Women's Home were each visited. The girls placed fruit with card, at each plate, and at the Refuge, one of the girls read an earnest call for the women to give themselves wholly to Christ.

The Pansy Band have carried fruit from this Mission to a dear little invalid who had been discharged from the Children's

Hospital, as incurable.

Fourteen members of the Union contributed canned fruit, and four, money, and the Union Treasury supplied \$1.50 for texts and street car fare.
