Miscellaneous.

HONORABLE MERCANTILE DEALINGS.—It might tempt one to be proud of his species, when he looks upon the fifth reported in a merchant by a distant correspondent, who, without one other hold of him than his honor, confides to him the wealth of a whole nation, and sleeps in the confidence that it is safe.

It is indeed an astonishing thought, and the gloom of a world's depravity, when he should recollect that which one man puts in another, though separated by seas and continents; when he fixes the anchor here and stands in dependence on the reported faith of one who never saw a man with all his fear for the treachery of the various elements through which his property must pass, he knows that should it arrive at the door of his agent, his fears and his suspicions may be at an end.

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BEGINNING IN THE WORLD.—There is nothing that distracts the slumber of young men so much as acting up in business. Beginning the world brings with it many serious thoughts. The hope of success, the fear of disasters, the ligaments of tenderness, the feelings of rivalry, all work deeply upon the youthful mind, and render its nights restless and uneasy. There are some tempers, however, that are eternally delighted with what may be called beginning the world. I knew a man who began business half a dozen times in a few years, and each time with a different set of rules. He had been every thing for a time, but nothing long.

There is much truth and some point in the above lines. Beginning the world, choosing a profession, and choosing a wife, are three things connected with life of much difficulty and importance. Young men seldom give either of them that deliberation and hope of futurity, are connected with their decision, of adversity and infancy, and their attendant consequences. As far as regards a profession, a man should never be too hasty in his determination. Almost every individual of the human family has a particular talent, which, when brought into requisition and applied to some exclusive object, cannot fail to attend with it some commendation. But the man who vainly conceives that he can succeed in every thing seldom becomes eminent in any. It is absurd policy to begin a second before the first has been rendered materially successful.

THE COMING TIME.—May we not be permitted to augur well for the future, and to hope that, religion going hand-in-hand with science and literature, the ancients would have called a golden age, and which those who speculated on these things two or three centuries ago would have designated Utopia? For one, cannot but prognosticate good from all these attempts which are being made, under diverse names and appliances, to enlighten the mind. In the various methods of diffusing information, whether by the multifarious agency of the Press, by Mechanics' Institutes, by Polytechnic Exhibitions, by Athenaeums and Schools of Design, by National Galleries and Museums, by Public Libraries, and by other expedients for encouraging the spirit of improvement and for multiplying the resources which are abroad, and in the example set by such men as your President (W. L. Whiston, President of the Durham Mechanics' Institute), the two Professors (Chevalier and Johnston) and others of their character and station who take part in the proceedings of an assembly like the present—in these, I do not despair of a brighter day for the populations of the world than has yet been seen or imagined. Yes! under Divine Providence, and with devout regard to the holy lessons which are mingled with these moments, I firmly believe they will be instrumental in forming sober and temperate habits, and in encouraging study, research, and inquiry among the working classes—in perfecting the art, in promoting science, in improving morals, in inculcating truth, in deepening religious impressions, and in directing thoughts from the wonders of Nature to the God of Nature, and from the mysteries of nature and matter to the sure and certain truths of Revelation.—Dr. Gilly.
