To Sell Big Racing Studs

Scipio, winner of the Two Thousand Guineas, One Thousand Guineas, Oaks and St. Leger in 1902 is to be sold with her foal for the benefit of the Red Cross Society when J. Musker's breeding stud is dispensed by auction at Newmarket on July 2, 16 and 18. She was once sold for \$125,000, the highest price ever paid for a mare. The establishment of her owner is the largest of its kind in England, embracing eight stallions, 251 mares, with their foals, and 74 yearlings. The Duke of Westminster's stud is to be sold on July 16.

PROFITS SHOULD BE TAXED

(Toronto Star.)

The country will learn with regret and amazement that the minister of finance does not intend to renew the taxes on excess profits. It is true that in some of his remarks he speaks of it as a war tax and gives an impression that it will continue as long as the war. But he evidently has no enthusiasm about this kind of tax. He intends to rely upon the customs tariff, and he refers with satisfaction to the results of the increase in customs duties made at the beginning of the war—resulting in the doubling of the revenue from this source.

The customs taxes, amounting to \$147,000,000 in the last fiscal year, come out of the pockets of the general taxpayers, including several hundred thousands who have relatives fighting in France. Apparently they are to be forced to pay still more, while the profiteers are to be released. The cost of living mounts skyward. The taxes increase the cost of living, while the profiteers they afford helps to fill the pockets of the profiteers. The food consumer is to pay, the food speculator is to be exempt.
