Interesting Career of John Coleman, Who Was With 22nd Regiment Here

The following is from the Portland Press:  
John Coleman, who for his cheery and genial disposition and soldierly bearing was well known to a large number of residents of this city for nearly fifty years, died at his home in Cumberland street on Saturday night.

During his entire residence in this city he was connected with the hotel business as a head waiter, and he enjoyed the acquaintance of a large number of men prominent in business and official circles.

We were born in Youghal, County Cork, Ireland, on June 24, 1842, the son of John and Honora Leahan Coleman. When he was about 19 years of age his parents moved to Lancastershire, England, where he went to work in the cotton mills. When 17 years of age, he, with a companion of about his own age, ran away from home with the intention of enlisting in the English navy. Owing to their age, the lads were not accepted

**JOE PAGE GIVES JACK COOMBS GREAT CREDIT**

Ready Pitching and Also Sends in a Run; The Features of Brooklyn's Victory Yesterday

Ebbetts Field, Brooklyn, N. Y., Oct. 10.—Well boys, the dope has gone wrong. On Saturday the Brooklyn looked like a lot of pikers and the Red Sox not much better. On Monday the Brooklynites gave Carrigan's crew the scare of their life. They were entitled to win the game on several occasions with perfect play. In a world's series record breaking contest today Jack Coombs, who practically got his professional start, after leaving Colby College, at St. John, N. B., where he endeavored himself to the thousands of fans and baseball enthusiasts of our old home town, showed himself for the first six innings to be the same old master-hand that he was in previous world championship contests.

It was his excellent control, combined with his masterly brain work as much as anything that gave the Brooklyn club today's game. Not only did he shine in the box, but in the third inning he singled and went to second on Gardner's error. Coombs came to the plate and on the second ball pitched landed to right centre for a clean single, scoring Olson from second. This was Brooklyn's third run of the game.

Coombs in the seventh inning, after Gardner had hit for a homer over the right field fence, asked to be relieved, as he could not stand the strain. Pfeiffer, who succeeded him, used a fast ball almost exclusively for the balance of the game. His control, together with speed, was such that not a Red Sox player reached first for the rest of the game.

The play of the Brooklyn club was fast and clean. They certainly disabused the minds of the royal rooters who accompanied the Boston team here that they were not a bright particular star for Boston on the defense. At least four of his seven chances were hard hit balls, and his stopping and accurate throwing prevented several additional runs for Brooklyn.

Shorten and Hooper on the offensive were there with the wallop, they getting five of the seven hits made by Boston. Shorten got three in the first three times up and going out on what looked to be a clean home on his fourth attempt. Wheat, by a magnificent run, gathered the ball in close to the left field corner.

The game today means that the series will have to come back to Boston, so that the St. John fans will at least have a chance to see another 1916 world series game. I look, however, to see the series end in favor of the Red Sox.
