LOCAL SHIPPING
The schooner Lydia H. Roper, Captain Berryman, arrived this morning from New York with a cargo of coal.

A report from Loch Leonard this morning said that the thermometer registered 2 degrees below zero. Another report was that skating was being enjoyed in the vicinity of Broadway.

WEST END FIRE
Between ten and eleven o'clock this morning a fire broke out in a wooden dwelling house, owned by Mrs. Hanson and situated at the corner of Rodney and Watson streets, West St. John. The fire did damage of between \$800 and \$400. The structure was one and a half stories with all. The fire gutted the house, despite the efforts of the firemen.

Last evening at eight o'clock at the home of the officiating minister, Rev. B. H. Nobles, in Cedar street, Miss Annie May Jenkins, Cumberland Bay, Queens county, was united in marriage to Henry Matthew Anderson, of this city. They were unattended. They will make up their residence in Kennedy street. The groom was formerly of a local battalion, but owing to some disability was unable to proceed overseas.

BIRTHDAY PRESENTATION

Mrs. Stackhouse was made the recipient of a beautiful parlor lamp, the occasion being her birthday. CAPT. GEO. KEEFFE HOME TOMORROW
Reaches Halifax and Will Come to St. John Saturday Afternoon

Captain George Keefe of the 26th Battalion, who has been invalided home as the result of serious wounds received in action after a career at the front in which he won an enviable reputation, has arrived in Halifax. He landed yesterday afternoon from the Mauretania which brought a large number of others who are suffering from the results of their participation in the world war. John Keefe of this city, father of the gallant young soldier, had a short conversation with his son over the long distance telephone wires this morning. Captain Keefe said that he was feeling quite well after the trip and his voice gave evidence that he is recovering his strength.

ON THE RIVER

The river steamer Hampstead is caught in the ice at Upper Gagetown according to a telephone message received by her owners this morning. The Viking was dispatched to her rescue. The ice at Upper Gagetown is said to be more than two inches thick, and steamship officials expressed doubt as to the Viking being able to break her way through.

The Ocoee arrived at Indiantown this morning and reported that ice was forming from Public Landing to Brandy Point. It is still thin and so far would not interfere with the passage of traffic in the Reach. The Ocoee started out yesterday for Hampstead, but succeeded in getting only as far as Brown's Flat.

BURIED BY SHELL; THEN WOUNDED

St. John Soldier Comes Through Exciting Experience

PTE. WILLIAM QUINN

Interesting Story of the Fighting on the Somme—His Chum, James Seymour, a New Brunswicker, Loses His Life

The following letter was received by Mrs. Patricia Quinn, 127 Erin street, from her son, Pte. William Quinn, who left Canada with the 55th Battalion, but was transferred to another regiment. Pte. Quinn was wounded in the arm at the Somme and has had a trying experience, which he interestingly and graphically describes. He is now in England in hospital. The letter follows:—

Dear Mother:—
"I will now try and write you a few lines to let you know that I am well, and trusting you are the same. My wound is now nearly all healed, but the arm is still sore. I suppose when you received the telegram you thought I had been killed, well, thank goodness I had not, but I never want to be as near to it as I was then. I will tell you now a little about the whole thing.

"Our brigade arrived at the Somme on September 12. We had no huts to go into, so we had to make the best of it. My mate and I had to make stretchers out of our ground sheets. Next day I found we were near the 30th Battalion, and I went over and had a talk with some of them, especially the men who were wounded and sick, waiting for their hurry-up cars. They would cry out to us: 'Do your duty boys.'

"At 2 p. m. I could smell the powder, see the shells bursting, the machine gun bullets hitting the ground. We were in the line and then one would drop and another would get up and take a trench that Fritz was holding. Well, I dug a hole so I could get clear of the flying shrapnel. My mate did likewise, his name, I might say, was James Seymour from New Brunswick. There were two highly explosive shells hit handy to us, and they were very close. I said to Jim, 'We had better get out of here,' but we had not time. Then I heard voices crying out 'where is your head?' I could not see the direction, then I felt the weight of someone standing on my head and shoulders, and I yelled out 'Get off my head.'
