BASEBALL. World's Series October 8. New York, Oct. 8.—The National Commission, at its meeting today, decided that the first game of the world's series shall be played in Philadelphia on Friday, October 9. The second game is set for the next day, October 10, in the same city. The third and fourth games will be played in Boston on October 11 and 12 respectively, the fifth in Philadelphia on October 13 and the sixth in Boston on October 14. The seventh game, if one is necessary, will be played on Friday, October 15. The place for this game will be chosen by the toss of a coin.

Chicago Leads Federals. Chicago, Oct. 8.—In the tightest league race ever staged the Chicago Federals narrowly won the flag by winning the second game of a double-header from Pittsburgh, after having dropped the first game. Three runs in the sixth inning of the second game, however, settled the ownership of the emblem. The enormous crowd went wild over the victory. The Federals were Pittsburgh, 5; Chicago, 4; Pittsburgh, 0; Chicago, 8. The first game went to eleven innings, while the second was called after the visitors' half of the seventh inning. The league race was in doubt until the final game was played today, as for weeks past there had been a constant shifting of positions on the part of Pittsburgh, Chicago and St. Louis, the Missouri city not being eliminated until yesterday, when a defeat by Kansas City put it out of the running. The three teams finished with only a little over three points separating them.

Hardly Likely to Be Hitched. President Jos. J. Lamm of the Boston Americans, who left Boston on Friday night for New York, to attend the meeting of the National Commission to arrange for the world's series, asserted that the series would not be played until the Federals were allowed a block of 400 seats at \$3 each for the games to be played in Philadelphia. William F. Baker, president of the Philadelphia Nationals, on Friday night refused such a request, saying that only 85 seats were available.

News of the Boxers. Hector McInnis has been picked to referee the Schubert and Mickey Brown bout in New Bedford on Oct. 12. Harry Pollok, a New York manager of scrappers, has been staked to a white horse by Jim Coffroth, a California promoter. The new heavyweight, who Pollok figures, will make him a good bank roll, and bring him more fame as a manager, is Bill Sloane, a six-foot-two giant from Nevada. Coffroth has sent

a good record along with Sloane and if the record is right, he is a wonder. Charley White, a Chicago lightweight, who will meet Matt Baldwin in Boston tomorrow night, is out to get a new boxing record, that is defeating all the best lightweights in Boston. He has two of them on his list already and he figures Baldwin, who is the New England title holder, will be his third victim. Charley White of New York, will be the referee. Jack White, brother of Charley, will meet George Chaney in Baltimore on Oct. 19.

Willie Beecher has agreed to take Young Saylor's walls at Akron, O., tonight. Saylor is also going to tackle Joe Welling in Milwaukee on Oct. 9.

COBB STILL IS THE LEADER OF THE BATSMEN

Chicago, Oct. 2.—Tyraus Cobb of Detroit, continues to lead the American league batsmen. Averages published on Saturday show the Georgian hitting .369, while Eddie Collins, of Chicago, is the runner-up, 30 points behind. Fournier, team-mate of Collins, is next with .328. Others who have played in at least half of the games are: Speaker, Boston, .320; Kirtke, Philadelphia, .316; Jackson, Cleveland, .312; Veech, Boston, .308; Gainer, Boston, .296.

Cobb continues as the leading run getter, with 123, five behind the American league record he made in 1911. In total bases he leads with 265. Sam Crawford, of Detroit, being a close second with 261.

In stolen bases Cobb, who set the new record for Americans last week, promises to run his total into the century mark. He now has 93 thefts to his credit.

Olding, Philadelphia, and Notz, Cleveland, have tied for home run honors with 264. Leads in club batting with 264; Leads in second with 263, and in home runs with 264. The leading pitchers of the league are: Shore, Boston, won 20 and lost 7; Foster, Boston, 20 and 7; Huston, Boston, 17 and 7; Leonard, Boston, 16 and 6; Boland, Detroit, 15 and 6; Daus, Detroit, 15 and 6; Freeman, Boston, 26 and 13; Scott, Chicago, 23 and 12; Ayers, Philadelphia, 15 and 8; Corvelick, Detroit, 20 and 7; Fisher, Chicago, 23 and 13; Galla, Washington, 17 and 10; Fisher, New York, 15 and 11; "Smoky" Joe Wood, of Boston, won 15 and lost four.

In the National League Ludenrus of Philadelphia, and Doyle of New York, are tied for first place in batting honors, each with an average of .317. Following are: Hinchman, Pittsburgh, .307; Griffith, Cincinnati, .306; Daubert, Brooklyn, .305; Robertson, New York, .299; Merkle, New York, .298; Snyder, St. Louis, .297; Collins, Pittsburgh, .291; Long, St. Louis, .291.

Cincinnati leads in club batting with 255, and St. Louis is second with 253. New York, with 240, is tied with Brooklyn for third place. Doyle is leading run getter, with 83 to his credit. Cravath, Philadelphia, leads in total bases with 237, and in home runs with 23, only two less than the major league record established by Freeman of Washington in 1899. Carey, Pittsburgh, leads in stolen bases with 37.
