NAVAL BATTLE NEAR HALIFAX?

Schooner's Crew Hear Reports of Gun Fire—Maritime Casualties—How Lieut. Kelly's Guns Reached the Trenches

The captain and crew of a schooner loading near Halifax report having sighted three British warships steaming at full speed early in the afternoon and that shortly after the craft had passed out of sight they heard the reports of heavy guns fired in rapid succession and felt the earth shake from the concussion. They counted from 42 to 47 shots. Sergt. Guy Roderick Turner who has been reported wounded formerly was the principal of the public school in this city.

The morning casualty list includes the names of Charles A. Wallace, Yarmouth, N. S., prisoner at Meschede.
Lieutenant C. S. Craig of Coburg, Ont. in a letter to his mother tells how he and Lieutenant Kelly of St. John got their guns into the front trenches by muffled the wheels with old tires and covering the guns with old bags. They did great execution before both officers were wounded.

Lieutenant Clarence B. Smith, 28th Battalion in a letter, tells of sighting a United States warship on the way across and of a rumor that the neighboring nation had declared war on Germany.
Captain George P. Bowie, 5th Battalion, Vancouver who has died of his wounds was engaged to a former St. John lady now residing in Vancouver.
Governor Davidson announced last night that more than enough for the purchase of two aeroplanes promised by Newfoundland has been subscribed and the Reid Railway have each promised one.

Leslie Creighton, son of H. C. Creighton, who is now in the firing line has written an interesting letter to his people telling of recent activities at his part of the line.
