Evangelical Alliance Defers Taking It Up at Meeting Today

The first monthly meeting of the Evangelical Alliance for this season was held this morning at the Y. M. C. A., with the president, Rev. A. L. Tedford, in the chair. A report from a committee on matters of Sabbath observance was not taken up, as the secretary of the committee having this matter in hand, Rev. H. A. Goodwin, was not present. This will be dealt with at a special meeting to be held next Monday. At that meeting Rev. W. Bamfield, secretary of the Bible Society, Nigeria, West Africa, will also be present and tell of the work in that country.

Rev. Waldo C. Machum, secretary of boys' work under the Maritime Religious Education Council, will be heard in an address on the work among the boys.

A copy of the history of 40 years activity of the Alliance, which is proposed to place in the Free Public Library for reference, was on exhibition and the secretary was complimented on the manner in which he had it bound.

Mr. Dobson's missionary work, it is expected, will be in the northern part of Saskatchewan.


WILL COST \$20 TO RING IN FALSE ALARM OF FIRE

Bill Affecting Fairville System to be Submitted to County Council
