

BATTLE BETWEEN TILDEN AND TENNIS OFFICIALS IS LOOMING

Big League Training Camps In Full Swing For Coming Season

CHAMP. WANTS TO PLAY FOR BENEFIT SUNDAY

Tennis Association Has Declined To Issue Sanction

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—William T. Tilden, 23, national champion and stormy petrel of the lawn tennis world, is on the warpath again, according to statements issued recently following the announcement of the sanction and schedule committee of the United States Lawn Tennis Association that sanction for the proposed exhibition matches at Madison Square Garden next Sunday between leading American and French players had been officially refused. This was for a benefit.

Tilden precipitated the present crisis when he issued a lengthy statement in which he ridiculed the action of the national governing body and declared he was ready to go ahead and play sanction or no sanction, and added that he had received assurances from the rest of the American players who had been advertised to appear, namely, Vincent Richards, Francis T. Hunter and Dr. George A. King, that they also would play.

But the full force of Tilden's defiance of the U. S. L. T. A. was considerably weakened when it became known that Jean Borotra, captain of the visiting French team, which was scheduled to play the Americans in these exhibition matches, had decided to abide by the ruling of the national body and refuse to compete. It was the international favor in the program that had been the chief attraction held forth to attract the crowd, and with the withdrawal of the Frenchmen, Borotra, Rene Lacoste and Jacques Brugnon, the bottom literally dropped out of the affair.

Tilden, in his statement, said: "It seems to me that it is not only unfortunate, but absolutely ridiculous that such a worthy enterprise, in which so many influential and important individuals and organizations have united to aid the cause of humanity can be endangered, if not actually balked, by the red tape and sluggish action of the committee."

"I trust that all followers of amateur sport who believe in the right of the individual to freely give his services to any worthy charity, will rally to the support of these matches. It is a fundamental principle of Americanism to aid humanitarian work and even our governing bodies of amateur sport cannot abrogate this principle. Developments are awaited with interest."

TRURO DEFEATED HALIFAX CRESCENTS

Second Game of Series Carded For Saturday Night at Truro

HALIFAX, Feb. 26.—At the Arena tonight before 3,000 fans, which included over 400 from Truro, the Maritime champions handed a 3 to 0 defeat to the local team in the first of perhaps the fastest and certainly the most stubbornly fought battle staged here in recent years. The Truro front line outclassed the local attackers. It was the sound work of Pete McDonald and Cyril Ratchford on the defence and the remarkable goal-tending of "Pop" Hanrahan in the nets that kept the score as low as it was. Saturday night the Crescents journeyed to Truro for the second and final game of the series.

GREB VS. FLOWERS

TRURO, N. S., Feb. 25.—Scoring a 2 to 3 victory after 10 minutes overtime play, St. Francis Xavier College's hockey team captured the Maritime Intercollegiate championship here tonight after a rugged tussle with the University of New Brunswick. Five hundred spectators witnessed the play.

ST. F. X. ANNEXES MARITIME TITLE

Nova Scotia College Boys Score Two Goals in The Overtime Period

TRURO, N. S., Feb. 26.—In the first five minutes of overtime play St. Francis Xavier scored two goals against the University of New Brunswick hockey team here last night and won the Maritime intercollegiate championship. The match was a ding-dong battle all the way and there was absolutely no choice between the two teams. The third period ended two all with both teams extending themselves to the limit. Two minutes after the opening of the overtime period "Chook" McDonald drove the rubber clean between the skates of the U. N. B. goal.

One or two players were between McDonald and the cage, and Hickson did not see the puck. A little later McDonald, right wing of the Antigonish team, drove a high one past Hickson, from close in, the Fredericton boys had a chance to stop them, two goals, which clinched the championship for Nova Scotia.

"Chook" McDonald, five minutes after the game started notched up the first counter for St. Francis, when he coaxed Hickson out of the cage. Four minutes later he repeated from a mix-up. Just before the bell sounded, Keen, U. N. B. forward, scored for the Fredericton boys, when his shot was deflected from the St. F. X. goal-keeper's skate and went into the net.

U. N. B. went into the second period to win and had the better of the territory. Time and again the Antigonish goalies had to handle shots that could have been converted into goals, if there had been someone to bat in the rebounds. Both teams absolutely ignored the rebounds, U. N. B. contenting themselves with trying to get by with long drives. Both cage guardians were good, though Hickson had the more difficult shots to handle, some of them being made from rather close in.

The battle went on with redoubled vigor, neither side being able to score, and the third period saw the figures still two all as at the close of the second.

INDOOR COMPETITION as given the local speed skaters at the Arena in the silver skate meet the other night should not be overlooked in the development of our skaters as it is only by constant practice at this rather tricky pastime that proficiency can be attained. The small rink has been the secret of Joe Moore's consistent successes as international indoor champion and if we expect our boys to go to the big meets at Madison Square Garden, New York, Duquesne Gardens, Pittsburgh, and elsewhere and expect them to make as creditable a showing as they do on the larger tracks, we must give them the proper chance to fit themselves. One of the pleasing features in connection with the recent indoor meet was the large number of juniors entered. That is a healthy sign and bodes well for the future. In the 12 and 14 year class it was found necessary to run four and five heats and two semi-finals and a final. In the latter class, the work of little Francis Logan, brother of Willie who cleaned up easily in the senior events, was outstanding. All the fine things said about this youngster are being carried out by him in excellent manner. He won the outdoor track a few weeks ago and repeated his performance indoor. The 16 and 18 year old classes have several very good youngsters competing. The work of Stewart, Robert Kelly and Clement O'Connor showed up well in the intermediates.

CONGRATULATIONS to Campbellton for its well-earned victory in the finals for the New Brunswick amateur hockey title, 1926. It has been a long time since Campbellton had a championship team but apparently the long wait has not dulled the ardor of the North Shore fans if the reporters are not too enthusiastic over their "official" counts at the game. After a strenuous and hectic season against Bathurst, Chatham and Fredericton—always three tough nuts to crack in hockey—Campbellton emerged with the honors in a three-cornered play-off and followed this up with a 4 to 2 win over Moncton Atlantics on home ice. They demonstrated they are no flash in the pan by making it 8 to 2 last night at Moncton. Instead of playing a defensive game last night and holding their two-goal lead, Campbellton adopted a line of strategy that brought results. They figured the best defense was a crashing offense and they got away with it. That is the great trouble with many teams who get a slight lead. They let the other fellow do all the attacking and in many cases find themselves in a mess by the time the final gong sounds.

\$5,000,000 ELEVATOR FOR B. C. PLANNED
