**MATTERS BEFORE WOMEN'S COUNCIL**

**Sorry to Learn Miss Bondfield Cannot Come Here to Speak.**

At a meeting of the local Council of Women yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms, Mrs. Alfred W. Eatey, president, was in the chair. A report was read on "Made in St. John" goods, by Mrs. J. D. Seely, convener of household economics, one of the national standing committees.

Mrs. H. B. Peck, corresponding secretary, reported on other things, a letter from the Trades and Labor Council, thanking the Women's Council for their decision to co-operate with them in their efforts to bring Miss Jessie Stephens, a British Labor delegate, to speak in the city. Mrs. Peck, Mrs. E. A. Young and Mrs. G. Wilford Campbell were appointed to act with a committee from the Trades and Labor Council to arrange for the meeting in October.

Announcement that Miss Bondfield, of the British Commons, had sent word to the Trades and Labor Council that she would not be able to speak in St. John was heard with regret.

**Milk Report.**

Mrs. E. A. Young read the report of the Milk Fund committee and a resolution that the council buy the milk where it could be purchased cheapest was passed. The members agreed that the process of pasteurization and care of the milk was the same in all the dairies. A committee, composed of Mrs. Eatey, Miss Dora Coates and Miss Ethel Hearn Jarvis, had visited all the leading plants in the city and had excellent reports to give of all. Offers of 10 and eight cents had been made. It was felt by the meeting that if the last named price promised to be stable that they would patronize the concern making such a generous offer.

A resolution sent in by Mrs. W. B. Tennant, re handing over the milk distribution to the Health Centre or the Board of Health was laid on the table until later in the season.

Mrs. E. A. Young read a resolution re more justice for soldiers' dependents and soldiers' pensions to be forwarded to Mrs. W. R. Morris, Peterboro, Ont., standing convener of the national committee for this department.

Miss Grace Leavitt, treasurer, pro tem, gave the general financial report and that of the milk fund. The expenses for the last month for the milk fund had been paid.

It was said that cigarettes were being sold to very young children, who were estimated to buy for some older member of their family, but were themselves using them. The sentiment of the meeting was that dealers should use more precautions in their sale.

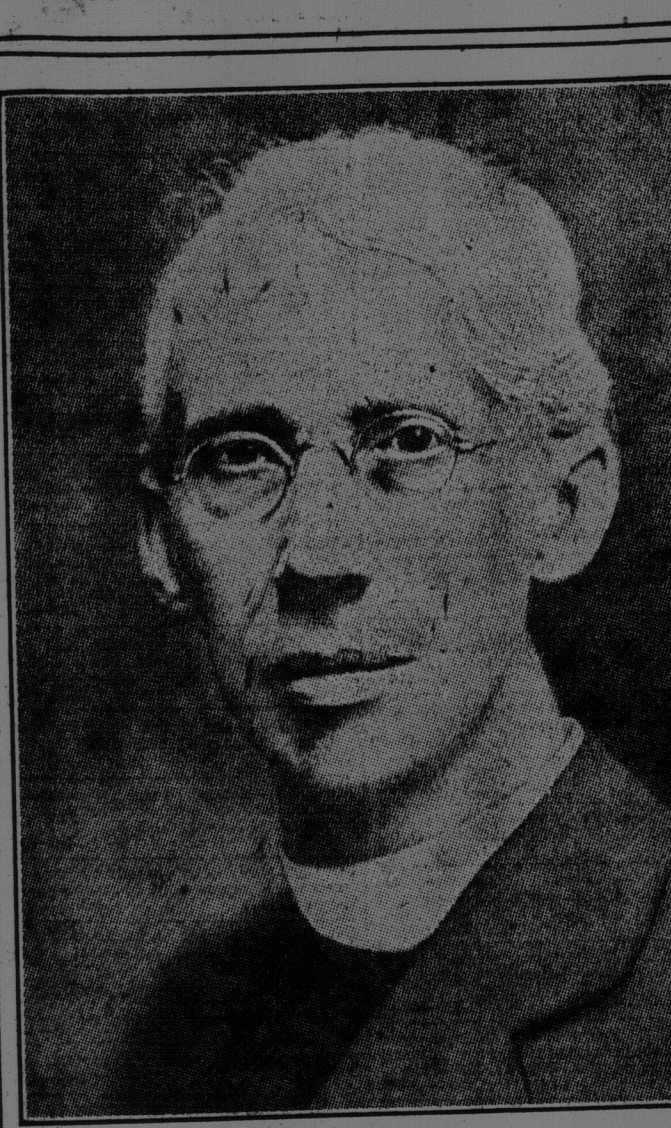
