his privilege to talk to; and third, the

way in which they had taken their place

with the white men in the war just past.

His Worship then congratulated the

boys on their fine club rooms, which

he said were as good as those of any

boys' club he had seen. He hoped the

boys would appreciate the work of the

men who gave their valuable time to be-

lieve there.

said he hoped the boys would grow up

to take an interest in the other fellow.
