ST. JOHN WANTS MR. PRITCHARD'S VERY BEST MAN STORY TO COURT

Saskatoon Pointed to in The Matter of Deciding on New Board of Trade Secretary

Discussing the question of secretary for the board of trade, a gentleman who has just returned from the west said to The Evening Times this morning that St. John in this matter should not be less enterprising than towns in the west. He took the city of Saskatoon as an illustration. Ten years ago said Saskatoon was a spot on a map. Today it is an ambitious and rapidly rising city. "Now," he said, "what have they in St. John? In the first place there is a board of trade commissioner, who is well known in St. John and is an assistant. In addition to this, however, there was organized what is called the Industrial League Limited, which set out to make available a large amount of money to encourage the establishment of new industries in Saskatoon. The league sent to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and secured the services of James A. Bell at a salary of \$8,000. It has since given him an assistant. "There you have a general manager and a commissioner," he said, "and the board of trade officials in all whose sole business is to boost the city of Saskatoon. I do not think I am out of the way in saying that the expenditure in salaries alone for these men is between \$15,000 and \$20,000 a year, and Saskatoon, for the advantages and opportunities afforded for a moment compare with the city of St. John. What the Industrial League Limited and the board of trade have accomplished for Saskatoon is an interesting and inspiring story. "It would seem to me, looking over the situation in St. John, that the board of trade should not for a minute consider the question of salary in getting the best man available to succeed Mr. Anderson."

LOCAL NEWS

THE A. M. GIBSON. Schooner Arthur M. Gibson is at Campbellton today from New York.

STILL ALARM. The North End chemical engine was called out to the Grand Union Hotel in Mill street this morning to extinguish a slight fire which had started in the dining room of the hotel. The damage done was very slight.

JUVENILE COURT. A young lad, Thomas Hayes, charged with playing truant from school, was arraigned in the juvenile court today. He pleaded guilty, but was allowed to go on condition that he attend school regularly in the future.

THE POLICE. Sergeant Joseph Scott, who has been connected with the North End division of the police for some time, has been transferred to the city division and is doing duty in Sergeant Campbell's place this week. Policeman J. Smith is doing the work of night sergeant in the North End now.

THE J. M. HARLOW. Reports received from St. Martin's this morning are to the effect that the schooner J. M. Harlow, which went ashore at Quaco last week, is still hard and fast on the rocks there. The cargo of lumber remains intact. An effort will be made to haul the schooner off at high tide this evening.

THE CONTRACT AWARDED. The contract for laying 430 feet of sewer main in Church street was awarded to the commissionaire this morning to R. M. Tobias. The contracts for the water and sewer extensions in Keltic street have not yet been awarded. The date for the conference between the city commissionaire and the C. P. R. regarding the company's proposal to purchase the strip of land opposite the Fairville station has not been arranged.

BURIED TODAY. The funeral of Miss Annie Mullin took place this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the home of her sister, Mrs. Henderson, in Main street. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. D. B. Eley and Rev. J. J. McCaskill, and interment was in Fernhill.

PRESENTATION. A large number of friends and well-wishers, including the young ladies dramatic club of the home of Miss Nan Cormier, Lancaster Heights, on last Friday evening. The occasion was in anticipation of an interesting event which will take place within a couple of days. Numerous gifts were made to Miss Cormier, the chief one being a silver scallop dish, suitably engraved and presented in a delightful manner by Miss Molly Fobin on behalf of the Ladies' Club. The occasion was enjoyed by all and will long be pleasantly remembered.

POLICE COURT. Three prisoners faced Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning. Daniel Donahue, charged with begging in Germain street, pleaded guilty and was sent for three months to the Municipal Home. He had called at Commissioner McLellan's home and because of his attitude there, the commissioner gave him in charge.

John Davis, charged with using obscene language in Charlotte street last night, pleaded guilty and was remanded. One prisoner, charged with drunkenness, was fined \$8 or thirty days in jail.
