WOMEN'S COUNCIL WON'T TAKE "NO" FOR ANSWER

The quarterly meeting of the Saint John Local Council of Women was held in the King's Daughters' rooms and several important matters came up for discussion. The president, Mrs. David McCallan, stated that it gave her great pleasure to be able to announce to those present that Miss Scott had kindly consented to prepare a paper on Pure Food to be read at the quinquennial meeting of the National Council.

Mrs. Robert W. Thomson was elected to preside at the session of the committee on public health at the quinquennial meeting of the National Council.

The matter of the appointment of a jail matron and the use of a patrol wagon came up for discussion, and Mrs. McCallan and Mrs. Thomas H. Bullock, who have both taken a very active stand in regard to these matters and have registered no opportunity in bringing before the proper authorities the great existing necessity for a prompt attention to the requests of the Local Council of Women touching these two matters, expressed great regret that as yet nothing had been accomplished.

The petition for a patrol wagon has been laid "upon the table" and the chief of police has stated that there are "other things more necessary than a jail matron." It was decided, nevertheless, to bring up this two very important matters from time to time, with the hope that the authorities may in the near future, change their views with regard to them.

"It is a disgrace to our city," said a member of the council, "that women in a state of intoxication should be dragged to jail through the public streets, and no respectable woman can view such a sight without a feeling of intense indignation that such a deplorable state of affairs should be allowed to continue. And, with all due respect for the opinion of our chief of police with regard to the appointment of a jail matron, the council is of the same opinion still—that this matter should be attended to at once. The present arrangement is degrading and debasing to women already victims of evil habits; and what can be more necessary than the alteration of conditions which serve to still further rob them of their self-respect. It is urged that all possible influences tending to the uplifting rather than the lowering of this class of women, should be brought to bear. The appointment of a jail matron would be a right step in this direction."

A motion was passed that the council endorse and support in every possible way the action of the W. C. T. U. in petitioning the legislature for the establishment of juvenile department courts.

Miss Grace W. Leavitt moved that Mrs. David McCallan be made a life member of the National Council. The motion was seconded and unanimously carried.

Mrs. McCallan in a few well-chosen words expressed her deep appreciation of this mark of esteem from her fellow-workers.

The following were appointed conveners of the standing committees:

A motion was passed that the council Press, Miss Mabel Penney French; laws for the better protection of women and children, Mrs. T. H. Bullock; citizenship, Miss Grace Murphy; objectionable printed matter, Mrs. Grey; immigration, Mrs. Britain; education, Mrs. C. B. Allan; supervisor of playgrounds, Miss Mabel Peters.

As Lady Drummond, who was nominated at the annual meeting as a delegate to the national quinquennial, has expressed her inability to attend, and her desire to withdraw, Mrs. Bayfield was nominated in her place. The other nominees are: Mrs. David W. McCallan, Mrs. Robt. W. Thomson, Miss Grace W. Leavitt, Miss Mabel Peters, Mrs. Dennis of Halifax, Mrs. Day of Victoria, B. C., Mrs. O. C. Edwards of McLeod, Alberta, and Mrs. Asa London of Ottawa.
