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COST OF MILK PRODUCTION GIVEN TO COMMISSION

Prof. Toole of Guelph Agricultural College Gives Result of His Observations.

Ottawa, Ont., June 9.—Professor Toole, of the Guelph Agricultural College, gave the cost of living committee of the Ontario Milk Producers' Association, this afternoon, figures of cost of the production of butter, beef and pork. These figures were the result, he said, of tests undertaken, supervised or observed by himself.

For the year ending February 28, 1918, a careful account was kept of the cost of 437 Oxford county farmers. Five hundred dollars was allowed to the farmer as wages and seven per cent for his investment. Other expenses were accurately allocated and they found that the average cost of milk was \$2.17 per 100 pounds.

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INDUSTRIAL INVESTIGATORS GET SOME COMEDY AT AMHERST

Feeling Ran High at the Meeting and the Chairman Was Obligated to Call for Order—Workmen Were Well Represented and "Haw Hawed" at Many Statements Made by Manufacturers.

Amherst, N. S., June 9.—The charge that the factory inspector of Nova Scotia had not visited plants in this town for two years was made at the session of the Industrial Relations Commission, held in the court house here, this afternoon. This claim followed a description of alleged violations of the Provincial Factories Act in textile plants and foundry here, and the contention that they were causes for labor unrest.

Feeling ran high at the meeting on the account of the general strike which is in progress in the town for the recognition of the "one big union and collective bargaining." Laughter greeted the announcement of one manufacturer that he was willing to law, while the union workers, who turned out several hundred strong, warmly applauded any statement that appeared to favor them.
