

MacSWINEY DIES IN BRIXTON AT END OF 73 DAYS

Death Came to Food Striker
After He Had Been Uncon-
scious for 36 Hours.

BROTHER AT HIS SIDE AT DEATH

No Demonstration When
News of His Death Became
Known on Streets.

While in Wakefield jail, Yorkshire,
in 1916, he met Muriel Murphy,
sister of a wealthy Cork distiller,
who visited the jail, and shortly after
they were married, despite much op-
position.

MacSwiney was elected as a Sinn
Fein member from Cork to the British
parliament in 1913, but never took
his seat. He was present at the first
session of the Irish parliament in 1919
when the establishment of the repub-
lic was confirmed, and was elected
lord mayor of Cork in 1920.

For various political offences, he
had been in jail with brief intervals of
liberty, since January, 1916, and in
October, 1917, secured his release
from jail by hunger striking.

MacSwiney was unconscious for 36
hours before his death came, it is
stated. Father Dominic, therefore,
was unable to give him the last sacra-
ments, but he administered extreme
unction.

The cause of MacSwiney's death
was heart failure, according to a
statement issued at the Home Office.
This statement is considered an in-
direct answer to the criticism of Dr.
Joseph Oldfield, the physician and
publicist, who had declared it was
wrong for the lord mayor's doctors
to administer meat juice and brandy.
He said brandy was a poison and that
a man at the point of death was very
susceptible to poison. Dr. Oldfield
added that when a man fasted a long
time the first food he could endure
was fruit juice.

Cork, Very Bitter.
Cork, Oct. 25.—Fervent interest in
possible developments caused by the
death of Lord Mayor MacSwiney of
this city, which occurred in Brixton
prison, London, this morning, is min-
gled with the grief in which his death
has plunged many people in South Ire-
land. Although these people appear
stirred to the highest degree of bitter-
ness, it is regarded as extremely im-
probable that there will be any out-
breaks or disorderly demonstrations
in this city.

It is expected, however, there will
be a considerable extension and in-
tensification of guerrilla warfare
against the police and military forces,
which, antipathetic to reprisals, are
frustrating their vigilance, especially in
remote districts.
Cork jail, where a number of hun-
ger strikers are in a grave condition,
is guarded inside and out by soldiers
equipped with machine guns.
There is an exceptionally large gar-
rison here. It is equipped with a
number of tanks and is ready for in-
stant service.

No One Near Jail.
London, Oct. 25.—As soon as the
news of the lord mayor's death began
to spread through the city small knots
of people began moving toward Brix-
ton prison. The police, however, did
not allow anyone to move into the
street leading to the prison entrance,
keeping the people moving so that a
crowd would not form.

during the morning for the removal
of the body from the prison to St.
George's Cathedral, in London, as soon
as the inquest was ended. The body
will lie in state there until it is taken,
probably on board a special train, to
Dublin, where it is planned to place
the body for a day or two in the Man-
sion House.

MacSwiney's grave will be alongside
that of his official predecessor,
Lord Mayor Thomas MacDonagh, who
was shot in his home in Cork on
March 20.

MacSwiney will be the fourth to be
buried in this plot, the others being
MacDonagh, McQuibbin, who was taken
out of bed in his Gaiety home, and
shot, and McNulty, who participated
in the Easter rising in Dublin, in 1916.
A friend of the MacSwiney family,
who accompanied Mrs. MacSwiney
when she visited Brixton prison this
morning, said the lord mayor's tele-
gram of October 18 to the Cork hun-
ger strikers with reference to the
death of Michael Fitzgerald, in Cork
jail, in which he referred to Fitzger-
ald as having "died for his country."

DEATHS FROM SNAKE BITES IN INDIA ARE MUCH MORE NUMEROUS

London, Oct. 25.—India still pays its
annual tribute of human life to the
jungle. In fact, the number of deaths
from snakebite or the attacks of wild
beasts has steadily increased during
the last few years, a fact which has
been attributed to the great floods.
The rising waters have driven the as-
sents out of the lowlands up into the
villages, and have diminished through
drowning the natural food supply of
the larger wild beasts.

According to the figures just issued,
56 persons were killed by elephants,
25 by hyenas, 109 by bears, 351 by
leopards, 219 by wolves, 353 by tigers,
and 685 by other animals, including
wild pigs. No less than 22,478 died
from the bite of poisonous snakes. The
total of mortality is 24,878. A
great many cases of snake bite were
successfully treated with the Brunton

no one knows whether all or even a
large number of the cases treated,

venomous snakes.

CZAR'S BROTHER WITH WRANGLER

Grand Duke Michael is Said
to be the Dashing Cavalry
Chief, Genl. Slashstacker.

Vienna, Oct. 25.—That General
Slashstacker, General Wrangler's most
dashing divisional commander, is in
reality the Grand Duke Michael Alex-
androvich, brother of the former Czar,

Russia after the destruction of the

STORE HANDS STRIKE.

London, Oct. 25.—A strike of store
hands has caused the postponement of
the wool sales in Australia which had
been fixed for this week.

Work was begun in the spring of 1919
for the construction of the launching
of the Ada A. McIntyre. The new
schooner is the largest three-masted
schooner ever built at Moss Glen, a
rotted shipbuilding center in the old
shipbuilding days. She is built of Brit-
ish Columbia fir and native spruce
knees, beams, keels, etc., being hewn
by hand. The vessel is of particularly
staunch construction and has a keel
length of 147 feet. Her beam width is
35 feet, and she has a depth of hold
of 13 feet. Following the launching
the vessel will be towed through the
falls and taken to Lower Cove to be
rigged.
