LONDON, Aug. 5. Consols 92 1/2 to 93 1/2; broadsheet steady; corn 28s. 3d. to 28s. 6d.

The bishop of Ely will succeed the late Dr. Wilberforce as Bishop of Winchester.

A railway accident occurred last night between Ashford and Manchester, by which eighteen persons were injured, but none killed outright.

The members of the Revolutionary Junta at Cadix are under arrest. The city of Granada has surrendered to the Government troops. The Province of Andalusia is completely pacified. The debate in the Cortes on the new constitution will open on Wednesday. Captain Werner, who recently selected the Spanish insurgent gunboat "Vigilante," will be removed from command of the German squadron in the Mediterranean.

New York, Aug. 5. Gold 115 1/2; exchange 100 to 100 1/2. Hunter's Point Standard Oil Works, near the railroad depot, are on fire. Two immense tanks of oil are expected to explode every minute. The cars in the depot of the Flushing Railroad Company are being heated out, as fears of destruction of the depot are entertained. The flames are spreading rapidly. Loss will be heavy.

Paraguay reports that an almost hopeless anarchy is prevailing in that Republic. The revolutionists, under Caballero, are daily growing more formidable, and it is reported that the allied forces will assume the defensive of the capital.

The Beatty Correspondence.—The Last Stand on the Frontier.

The Montreal Herald and the Toronto Globe are publishing correspondence between Americans and James Beatty, a Toronto lawyer. They amount to literally nothing, except as going to show that Mr. Beatty counted upon an influence with Ministers, under circumstances afterwards proved he did not possess. It will be noticed that both letters are dated before the session of Parliament in 1872, and the issue of the Huntington charges.

The petitions continue to be circulated, but they are not largely or influentially signed in this section.

The Ministers are all expected back by Saturday.

Opposition papers, and notably the only religious daily in the world, are circulating infamous stories of Sir John A. Macdonald's having attempted to commit suicide in Riviere du Loup by drowning. The rumor is a base slander manufactured out of a joke of the Premier while in bad humor.

MONTREAL, Aug. 5.

Two letters are published in different papers written by J. Beatty, barrister, Toronto, addressed to C. M. McMillan, Montreal, Chicago, respecting the Pacific Railway matter, and more are promised. They are dated in January and February, 1872.

Beatty tells McMillan that arrangements for the Pacific Railway have been made this session, and suggests united efforts with the Government to carry them out. He says to this money will be necessary—a considerable sum.

Indignation Over the Last Outrage.—Sir John Macdonald to be in Ottawa this week.—McMillan Sues the Mail for \$50,000 Damages.—The Printers' Strike.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6. The rift rumor that Sir John Macdonald had attempted suicide by jumping over the wharf at Riviere du Loup creates intense indignation. A despatch was received yesterday by Hon. Mr. Langevin from Sir John, who states that he is well and will be in Ottawa this week.

McMillan has instituted a libel suit against the Toronto Mail for \$50,000 damages. It is only another part of the Grim conspiracy. They think this will create public opinion in favor of McMillan's veracity. They have no intention of pressing the suit after the 13th, the day for the meeting of Parliament.

The Typographical Union printers published a paper yesterday, principally published in the Times. The Citizen and the Free Press appeared in their usual size, and are determined to hold out against the Union.

THE QUEEN'S SPEECH.

Parliament was prorogued to-day. The Queen's speech was read by Royal Commission, as follows:

"MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN: In bidding you farewell for a recess, I make it my first duty to thank you for the loyal and prompt provision for my son, the Duke of Edinburgh, on the occasion of his approaching marriage. This marriage will, I trust, form a new tie of amity between the two crowns.

The best relations continue to subsist between myself and foreign powers. I am able to announce the successful termination of the mission to Zanzibar. The Sultan of Muscat and other native powers, which will provide the means for the more effectual suppression of the slave trade on the east coast of Africa.

I have been enabled to bring to a satisfactory issue the commercial negotiations with France in which my Government has been for some time engaged. Under the provisions of an instrument signed July 23d, and availing ratification, the Sultan of Muscat was again put in force with the comprehensive engagement contracts between the two countries, for mutual treatment on a footing of the most favored nation, and the differential tax on shipping under the British flag is removed. There are separate provisions in the treaty for the adjustment of the question of duties on mineral oils, and for the general relief and extension of trade.

I have likewise concluded treaties of extradition with Italy, Denmark, Sweden and Brazil. The ratification of the treaties with the two last named are not yet exchanged, but I anticipate no difficulty in this final step. I am engaged in negotiations for agreements of a similar

character with other States, both in Europe and beyond.

I am still occupied in giving effect to those provisions in the Treaty of Washington which relate to British claims against the United States, and to the interests of my possessions in North America.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS: I am very sensible of the liberality with which you have provided for the various charges of the State, and likewise enabled me promptly to meet obligations imposed upon me by the Award of the Arbitrators at Geneva, during the past year.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN: I have observed with satisfaction the progress you have been enabled to make in the reformation of the public burdens of reducing duties and income tax to points lower than any at which they previously stood.

The establishment of a Supreme Court of Justice, by which the record of your proceedings has been distinguished, will be found, as I hope to confer corresponding benefits on the country in the more cheap, certain, expeditious and effectual administration of justice. The Acts for the amendment of the Education Act of 1870, and if the endowed School Act of 1869, will, as I trust, tend to accelerate the attainment of solid national advantages through the extension of education in the middle and most numerous classes of the community. The Act relating to the regulation of railways and canals promises to conduce to a more harmonious working of the railway system of the country. I have with pleasure assented to an act relating to merchant shipping, from which and from the labors of the commission recently appointed I hope for a diminution of the risks to which the seafaring population are exposed.

The revenue has fully answered my expectations, and, although activity in trade in some branches may have been somewhat restrained by various causes, the general condition of the people continues to exhibit evidences of improvement.

These and all mercies of Divine Providence will, I trust, find a suitable acknowledgment alike in our works and hearts.
